LENIN PEACE PRIZE:

Members of the Kamloops Shuswap Peace Council were delighted to hear that Dr. John Morgan, President of the Canadian Peace Congress, is one of four international Peace Activists that has been awarded the Lenin Peace Prize for this years of devotion and hard work in the peace movement.

Dr. Morgan, who will receive his prize at a ceremony June 4th in Toronto, has spent virtually all his life in constant activity for peace; through the dark days when peace was ridiculed, attacked or ignored to the present when peace is not only accepted but recognized as the only sane solution for survival of our planet.

EDITORIAL COMMENT by Val Carey

The KSPC is deeply concerned for the future of peace and security in the Carribean and in Central America. Recent pronouncements and actions of the U.S. Governments would indicate that the U.S. has no intention of allowing the people of those areas to determine their future.

Barry Goldwater, with the approval of Ronald Reagan has threatened Cuba with invasion. This follows years of harrassment including the abortive Bay of Pigs invasion and numerous attempts on the life of Premier Fidel Castro. Neither is the U.S. willing to let the people of Grenada pursue their newfound freedom. Every form of harrassment is employed, including a programme of propaganda which labels the construction of the tiny countries first airport, a "Soviet base".

In Central America, the U.S. continues to support brutal repressive dictatorships with material, financial and military aid. In El Salvador where the poverty stricken, oppressed people are struggling for their freedom, U.S. military advisers train and lead the army in a manner uncomfortably reminiscent of the early days of the Vietman conflict. Counter-revolutionaries, armed and totally supported by the U.S. harass the popular government in Nicaraqua, in an attempt to return a Somoza-style dictatorship to that beleagered country, whose major offense in the eyes of the U.S. government has been to put the destiny of the population in the

hands of the People.

In the interest of world peace and security we join with the many voices world wide to urge the U.S. government to withdraw all military personnel from these areas, cease invasion threats, with draw support for repressive regimes, and allow the people to decide their future.

<u>APRIL 24th MARCH FOR PEACE</u>: Rain couldn't dampen spirits.

Our 4th annual Walk for Peace was very successful in spite of heavy rain during the morning.

Over 300 people walked from Allan Mathews School to St. Paul's Anglican Cathedral, who kindly hosted the rally due to the inclement weather.

Demonstrators sent a telegram to P.M. Truduea demanding Canada become a Nuclear Weapons free zone. Letters also were sent to President Reagan and Premier Yuri Andropov expressing concern about the growing arms race; and requesting that both governments honour Canada's position if she adopts a Nuclear Free status.

M.C. Keith Simmons expressed concern over the billions of dollars being spent on the arms race which should be diverted to massive job programmes, hospitals, education, etc.

M.P. Nelson Riis said he was appalled when he visited NATO, NORAD and the Pentagon and heard military leaders saying a nuclear war could be won.

Dr. Bob Woolard of Clearwater outlined the medical consequences of nuclear war, while Reverand Bruce Chamberlayne emphasized we must care deeply for Earth and confront what ever might destroy it.

School teacher Des McCambridge rounded out the speakers and asked educators to join him in the concern for peace.

Local musician Sandy Hall did an excellent job of organizing other local musicians to perform at the rally.

PEACE PETITON CARAVAN:


Starting in early August the peace petition caravan will be making its way from either end of Canada to meet in Ottawa about the 27th of the month. With the central issue being Canada's involvement in the Cruise missile and more specifically the testing of Cruise on Canadian territory, the Caravan will stop in many towns and cities across Canada, as they attempt to reach as much of the population as possible with the petition they are taking to Ottawa. In Ottawa, the Caravan will spend as much time as is necessary to stop Canada's involvement in the Cruise.

All concerned people are invited to participate in the Caravan; those who are in a position to go to Ottawa and stay there are most welcome but the Caravan organizers are also encouraging those who may only be able to travel for a few hours or days, to participate as well.

The Peace Petition Caravan will be stopping in Kamloops about August 8th, where a rally will be held and billets arranged for them. Planning is in very early stages so watch for further details in the press.
