# THE SUMMIT MEETING - A HOPE FOR PEACE IN 1986

People around the globe are anxiously awaiting the Soviet-American summit meeting scheduled for November 19th and 20th. The hope for a peaceful, safe future rests on the outcome.

Almost everywhere in the world, governments and political leaders have welcomed the new Soviet Peace Initiatives. The summit is an opportunity for serious negotiations, not for "acquaintance", as Washington says. Its aim is to find, in spite of the differences, zones of common or parallel interests and to hold an honest and unbiased dialogue with a desire to find a way back from the brink of a nuclear abyss, and to overcome the current negative trend in relations between the USSR and the USA.

The Soviet Union has prepared seriously and thoroughly for the meeting, and has worked out a firm negotiating position. The Soviet Union's decision to place a moratorium on all nuclear explosions; their proposal on peaceful use of space, submitted to the United Nations; and Gorbachyov's statement that the USSR would put forth radical proposals on nuclear arms cuts if the US gives up it's plans for Star Wars are seen everywhere as proof of this.

However, there is growing apprehension about the negative and even arrogant position of the US administration, which continues to reject any Soviet proposals, dismissing them as propaganda, without taking the time to study them. At the same time, Washington is stimulating the arms race and escalating tensions between the two nations. In spite of the opposition of some Congressmen, the US tested the ASAT, an anti-satellite device, against a real target in space. Even NATO forces refrained from openly supporting this negative position, taken on the eve of the summit; which angered the Penatagon chief, Caspar Weinberger, who declared that the Soviet proposals, including the moratorium on all nuclear explosions, "unpractical" and demanded that the allies turther escalate the arms race in all fields.

Until recently, the conception of equal responsibility for the arms race between the USSR and the USA has been propagated by the cold war in the west. That falsehood has been dispelled by the events of the last few months.

It is clearly the duty of peace loving people to examine the facts, keep informed, and to spread the correct information where-ever possible . Also, the peace and progressive movements around the globe, and especially the United States, must continue to pressure their governments into taking a correct position on peaceful coexisitence and the banning of nuclear weapons from Earth if we are to survive.





#### PSYCHOLOGY AND PEACE

Cariboo College hosts this year's Articulation Meeting of Psychology instructors from B.C.'s colleges and universities. Al MacKinnon, Psychology instructor at Cariboo, is taking the opportunity to address fellow educators on "Teaching Peace: Role and resonsibility of the psychologist-educator in the nuclear age."

MacKinnon notes that psychologists, with a few exceptions, have lagged behind other professional groups in responding to the nuclear threat. This is changing quickly, however, as evidenced by an increasing number of articles in the major journals of psychological research, a growing participation in peace education at some of our larger universities, and the work of Psychologists for Social Responsibility. This year, at the annual meeting of the Canadian Psycholological Association in Halifax, the Canadians Psychologists for Social Responsibility are presenting a programme on "The Psychological Effects of the Arms Race: Psych ologists as Peace Educators

While it is odd that psychologists would not lead the field in addressing this issue, it is encouraging that more and more professionals are awakening to the reality that as long as our very existence is held ransom to the arms race, nuclearism is also a major health problem.

### NOBEL PEACE PRIZE

The Nobel Peace Prize Cttee has finally recognized the international character of the peace movement by awarding this year's prize to the International Physicians for the Prevention of Nuclear War. IPPNW was formed by Dr. Bernard Lown of Harvard, one of the world's foremost cardiologists, and Dr. Evgeny Chazon, former personal physician to Leonid Brezhnev, and a member of the government of the USSR.

The two physicians met at an international conference on cardiology and turned their mutual concerns about the danger of nuclear war into the Nobel prize winning organization. This recognition of peace groups by The Nobel committee will have very positive results for the peace movement, and hopefully, will foster more unity and more international ties between the peace movement in the West and that in the Soviet Union.

# DR.FOULKS INEKAMLOOPSEFOREUN DIS-ARMAMENT WEEK

Dr. James Foulks, member of International Physicians for Prevention of Nuclear War, and Chairperson of B.C. Peace Council, was guest speaker at a social | hosted by KSPC for UN Disarmament Week in October.

Dr. Foulks talked about the many issues confronting us regarding the arms race; e.g., banning of nuclear weapons, star wars, nuclear free zones, the upcoming US/USSR summit talks, etc.

During the discussion on Star Wars, Dr. Foulks stated that the SDI system will violate treaties in effect now. He stated that Reagan didn't consult senior staff or military experts as to the feasability of star wars. Reagan apparently just "went out on a limb" when he gave the Pentagon the "go ahead". Dr, Foulks also told us that the x-ray lasers in outer space, needed to shoot down missiles will require nuclear explosions to trigger the beams, thereby doing unknown damage to our already fragile atmosphere.

Dr. Foulks concluded the discussion by pointing out the disgraceful waste  $\frac{CANADIANS}{CONCERNED}$  ABOUT SOUTH AFRICA of the world's natural resources that are being spent on the useless arms race, while people are dying in the world from hunger and lack of water.

# WORLD FESTIVAL FOR YOUTH

One of the major themes of the 12th World Festival of Youth and Students in Moscow last July was peace.

Over 20,000 youth from virtually every country in the world got together for celebrations, seminars, cultural events, and just plain fun. The delegates discussed problems facing youth, participated in peace activities, and made new friends.

Among the Canadian delegates was KSPC member, Darren Carey, who shot six hours of footage on video tape. That footage is in the process of being made into a half-hour video which will premiere on the Peace Council's show on Channel 10, within the next couple of months.

# SOUTH AFRICA

Anti-aparteid activists around the world denounced the execution of a black dissident in South Africa last month. The African National Congress vowed to avenge the hanging of Benjamin Moloise, a noted poet.

The Organization of African Unity joined the outlawed ANC, the main guerrilla group fighting the Pretoria Government, in urging the people of South Africa to avenge the killing.

In Paris, French Prime Minister Laurent Fabius observed a minute's silence outside the South African Embassy.

Nordic countries meeting in Oslo said that the hanging showed that it was vital to apply more pressure to end apartheid.

The United States expressed concern that the hanging, carried out despite international appeals for clemency, would worsen racial tensions, while Commonwealth leaders meeting in Nassau expressed shock and revulsion at the news


