NANOOSE NETWORKING CONFERENCE

Did you know that Nanoose Bay and Jervis Inlet are the site of the Canadian Forces Maritime Experimental and Test Range (CFMETR), one of the most sophisticated underwater weapons testing ranges in the world? The facility plays a major role in the testing and development of the U.S. Navy's antisubmarine warfare (ASW) strategy, an effort increasingly focused on attaining the capability to destroy all Soviet ballistic missile submarines on short notice.

The base is regularly visited by U.S. nuclear attack submarines, which are designed to carry nuclear and conventional weapons. An article in the Vancouver Sun in June 1984 revealed that nuclear armed cruise missiles called Tomahawks are fitted on at least two classes of these submarines. In June of 1985, a STURGEON - class sub visited the Nanoose range for nine days. It is not known if this sub has been refitted with Tomahawks. However, in May, August and September of 1985, LOS ANGELES - class subs were in that range. Each of these vessels were almost certainly armed with 8 - 12 Tomahawks. The widespread deployment of Cruise missiles, which can attack land based targets, threatens to seriously limit possibilities for arms control agreements.

The Nanoose Conversion Campaign is working to end the Military use of Nanoose Bay and Jervis Inlet and seeks to convert CFMETR to peaceful purposes.

To learn more about this serious situation please attend our Conference scheduled for May 24 and 25 to be held at Cariboo College, 900 McGill Road, Kamloops, B.C.
