

TOOLS FOR PEACE

Tools for Peace is a project of the Coalition for Aid to Nicaragua (CAN). CAN is a volunteer, non-profit organization composed of over 60 coalitions across Canada. Every year since 1981, churches, unions, community groups, and thousands of volunteers have taken part in the campaign, collecting tools to build, tools to teach and tools to heal. Tools for Peace also lobbies our federal government to increase aid to Nicaragua and to take a more active role in the South American peace process (the Contadora Peace Proposal of Mexico, Columbia, Panama, and Venezuela is one example.)

Since gaining freedom from the U.S. backed Samoza dictatorship in 1979, Nicaragua has moved forward in food production, education, health care, and in civil and political rights. The education budget alone has increased five-fold; adult illiteracy has been reduced from 58% to 10%, land has been given to 40,000 families, and in 1984 the first free elections were held with seven parties competing from all over the political spectrum. This is the challenge fuelling Nicaraguans -- to continue to build a new and just society.

However, President Reagan refuses to let Nicaragua exist on its own terms and is supporting a counter-revolution as well as a U.S. imposed embargo. This fall the U.S. government gave \$100,000,000 to aid the contras, and recently a U.S. plane was destroyed in Nicaragua carrying weapons and ammunition. One American, Eugene Hasenfus, was captured and his wife admitted that he worked for the CIA. All of this interference by the U.S. government is designed to prevent Nicaragua from deciding it's own destiny and from rebuilding it's society on it's own terms. Reagan has even spurned the Contadora Proposal and has rallied Nicaragua's neighbours against it. Central America, because of these U.S. policies is now becoming a battlefield.

The Canadian government and the Canadian people have indicated that they are opposed to these hostilities. The Canadian government is for peace, not war, in Central America and has increased its trade and aid with Nicaragua.

The Canadian people have increasingly expressed their support for Nicaragua through the Tools for Peace campaign. Nicaragua's efforts to rebuild a society after decades of dictatorship and poverty are an inspiration to all. Nicaragua holds out hope to the poor nations around the world. 

BOOK REVIEW

Brown and Robinson
"Unsafe Harbours:
Nuclear Weapons in
Canadian Ports"

Published by Operation Dismantle,
this book is a chilling account of
Nuclear warships in Canadian ports.

In the introduction there is a dis-
criptive article regarding a disaster
which took place in Halifax harbour
in December, 1917, when a French
munitions ship, the Mont Blanc
collided with another vessel.

"A spark from the collision ignited
the tons of explosives packed aboard
the Mont Blanc. The resulting ex-
plosion was heard as far away as
Prince Edward Island. Much of Hal-
ifax was flattened by the blast, by
the tidal wave which followed and
by the fire which raged through the
north end of the city. More than
1600 people were killed and another
9000 injured, out of the city's
population of 50,000. Twelve thou-
sand buildings were damaged and 1600
destroyed outright. The chance of
a further explosion, as fire threat-
ened ammunition stockpiles on shore,
led to evacuation of the city.

The Halifax explosion is still the
largest human-caused non-nuclear
explosion ever known. It happened
because the weapons of world war
(i.e. the ammunition aboard the Mont
Blanc) had entered the harbour of
a large Canadian city.

In the 1980's the weapons of world
war are again entering Canadian wa-
ters. But this time there is a danger
of a disaster which would make the
1917 explosion seem petty in compar-
ison."

The book goes on to tell us how many
nuclear armed vessel visit us on a
regular basis; that nuclear war is
more likely to begin at sea, describes
a potential contamination in B.C.
and what we can do to prevent all of
the above.

CRUISE TESTS TO CONTINUE

In spite of two disasterous tests
last winter the Canadian government
is allowing cruise tests to continue
this winter. We must continue to
pressure for the cessation of these
tests.

200,000 PROTEST FRG CRUISE BASES

Hasselbach, FRG - In numbers far
exceeding expectations, 200,000
West Germans participated in a mass
demonstration against the planned
deployment of 96 U.S. cruise miss-
iles.

Taking place on Oct. 11th, the day of
the Iceland meeting between Gorbachev
and Reagan, the demo' was a clear
message to Washington and West Germ-
any's right-wing government that
the West German people want peace
and a comprehensive arms control
agreement.

They declared that "Our country must
not participate in the research and
development of space weapons. They
protect no one and will not remove
nuclear weapons from earth. Pershing-
2 and cruise missiles must be re-
moved; nuclear weapons tests must end."

SCOTS LINK ARMS FOR PEACE

Scotland had its largest demonstrat-
ion ever on October 5th, as 45,000
people linked arms to form a human
chain between Glasgow on the east
coast and Grangemouth on the River
Forth on the west coast.


