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PEACE TAX CAMPAIGN CATCHING ON IN ENGLAND

British peace activist SYBIL COOKSON was among some people summonsed to court in Sussex last November for diverting that portion of her Income Tax destined to be spent on military preparations. In an open letter she wrote:

"Immediately I received the Summons, I went to see the Editors of local Press, Radio, and TV: they responded well, giving me good publicity beforehand.

"On Nov. 25, the day of my Hearing, (according to press reports) over 50 friends and supporters were assembled with banners, etc., to greet me with applause and embraces; while my lasting impression is a mass of cameras, people and reporters rushing to meet me! The result is that I am to be called again to the Judge's Open County Court later on.

"The point is the resulting publicity, for which I am grateful. Hopefully, it will have started more people thinking. Every adult in our country pays on average ± 8 per week towards the Military Budget.

"...Some will know of MP Denis Canavan's Bill allowing people to withhold that portion of their Tax which at present is spent on arms... and to facilitate its payment by them ...to peaceful purposes. ...Denis will be bringing up his Bill again in the coming year.

"All those in agreement, please write to your MP, urging support for this Bill - talk about the matter with friends and acquaintances: word of mouth is the best (and cheapest) form of publicity."

I'm happy to know of your plans to spread info. concerning "Amerika". ...Variety reported a "closed set", no reporters or visitors allowed. Last week (end of December) there was a piece in Variety to the effect that "Amerika" is having serious post-production problems - said by the producers to stem from not enough time to do all the cutting, editing, dubbing, etc. that are needed for a 12-hour mini-series - but one has to wonder if there may be some lack of funds, though no mention was made of any sponsor's pulling out. However, the birthday TV special about Reagan that was to be aired this week was cancelled before Christmas because all (continued overleaf)

6. (Letters, continued) the sponsors backed out! It may never be shown.

Peggy Walker, Los Angeles. In an earlier letter, Peggy advised: "If ABC does air this dangerous nonsense (under the guise of entertainment) the only way effectively to register a protest is by taking note of each company sponsoring "Amerika" and writing to each. Sponsors are really and truly sensitive to letters from the public, for the public is the consumers who buy the sponsor's product. Letters to the president of the company get attention - I know!"

Editor's note: I understand that CHRYSLER is the main sponsor. Does any one know of others, please?

Here are some more action ideas, from Comox Valley Nuclear Responsibility Society (CVNRS):-

1. Everyone should watch the first section.

- 2. Jam the telephone lines of ABC and every local station that is showing it, with complaints and your own personal reaction.
- 3. List the advertisers who sponsor the show and boycott their products. Advise every one of them what you are doing and will continue to do until the show is off the air.

4. Write letters to newspapers, MPs and anyone you can think of. Get as much publicity as you can for the boycott.

- → 3. Write letters to the Premier, the Min. of Energy and your MLA. Tell them that you do not believe the health of miners or the public at large should be jeopardized for the sake of 30 mining companies. Address of our provincial public servants: Parliament Buildings, Victoria, BC, V8V 1X4.
- 4. Send letters to the Times-Colonist, the Globe & Mail, the Vancouver Sun, the Province and your local paper. Use the media to reach other people, alerting them about your concerns.
- → 5. Raise the issue of the hazardous nature of uranium exploitation on call-in talk shows. The Premier appears on the 1st Sunday of every month on CKNW (98 AM Radio) from 1 - 2 p.m. Ask him how B.C. Medical Services will deal with the rising incidence of genetic-related diseases such as Down's Syndrome or with increasing numbers of cancer and leukemia victims that will inevitably occur if the moratorium is lifted. The Premier might also be asked how the wastes from the uranium industry will be dealt with, given that there is no safe means of disposing of them.

WHAT DO THEY KNOW?

- by Betty Fairbank, Motherpeace/Hornby Is.

Eight women were acquitted on January 15 of trespassing on DND property when it was found that they were in fact on public land below high water mark, on Winchelsea Island, Nanoose Bay.

The original action last August had been yet another attempt to establish dialogue with our government regarding its agreements and compliance with U.S. nuclear weapons testing programs in Canadian waters. The acquittal on a technicality served government interests by neatly silencing cur voices of inquiry and alarm one more time - no case, no dialogue.

A large and disturbing question remains: did higher authority at CFMETR/Nanoose, who ordered the arrests and proceeded to trial, know or not know that the foreshore below high water mark is legally accessible to all? If they knew, and planned the arrest regardless, then they (DND) are guilty of irresponsible intimidation and illegal proceedings, resulting in considerable expense and hardship to the arrestees, and in reprehensible waste of public time and money!

If they (DND) did not know the foreshore law, then it is reasonable to assume that they also may not know much more important things such as: what happens if fire breaks out on a nuclear-powered submarine in Nanoose Bay? Might the answer be "It's not our jurisdiction - it is a U.S. vessel."?

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DR. KAY LANGSTON

Those of you who were "in at the beginning" of B.C. Voice of Women will remember Kay. She was one of our founding members, being elected Provincial (also a National) Vice President in 1961. Dear Mr. Premier and Honourable Members:

I/We, the undersigned, request you to extend the moratorium on uranium exploration and mining in this province which is due to expire February 27, 1987.

In initiating the seven-year moratorium, former Premier Bill Bennett said that he was responding to the "very real" fear the public felt that uranium activity would do "irreversible harm to the environment and to us, the people who live in that environment."

Bennett felt that during the seven-year moratorium, our "knowledge of the handling of uranium may have progressed to the point where its mining is acceptable in B.C."

The passage of seven years has only made it more evident that the uranium in this province ought to be left underground. Not only is the mining and milling of uranium extremely hazardous to workers and the watershed; but also, no safe method of treating the waste ore or tailings exists. Recent legislative debates in the U.S. attest to these dangers. The tailings, which are hon-biodegradable, contain radioactive materials thorium (halflife: 80,000 years) and radium.

We urge you to protect the people of British Columbia by providing a permanent moratorium on uranium exploration and mining, for our "knowledge of the handling of uranium" has certainly not "progressed to the point where its mining is acceptable in British Columbia."

Also, the provision of uranium which is vital to atomic weapons production is a matter for moral consideration.
