### NEW LOOK ON CAMPUS . . .

#### Identity

In a press release of a few short paragraphs, dated March 20, 1989, the nearly two decades of history that was Cariboo College took a sharp turn, and the frantic pace of growth hasn't stopped since.



It was on this date that the Minister of Advanced Education, The Hon. Stan Hagen, announced the launch of the Access Initiative which brought degree granting status to Cariboo.

In just two years the size of the undergraduate population in degree programs has more than doubled. Over \$15 million has been directed to the development of new facilities and across the province Cariboo is clearly becoming recognized as a four-year University College. To reflect this change, a new two colour logo and institutional identity program has been approved by the College Board.

The new shield, a form traditionally associated with post-secondary identity in this country, features a bold red and deep purple colour combination. Within it are highlighted geographic features of the region and the strong symbolic graphic of the "coming together" of College and University in the creation of a unique entity.

Following formal approval for the use of the new name (The University College of the Cariboo, or UCC for short), the new identity program will be phased in over the next several months.

#### New Development and Expansion Projects


There have been many changes at Cariboo over the last year, the most exciting of which are the major construction projects started last September.

The Library has undergone a \$4 million expansion, doubling the size of the existing space, expanding the collection capacity and providing a significant expansion of study space available to students. The appearance of the building has been enhanced with the entrance to the library now facing the centre court of the campus. The two storey open glass entrance bears a strong element of similarity to the new Arts & Education Building, another of the exciting new projects underway.

This building is the first new classroom facility opened at Cariboo in the last decade and will be the new home for students taking a wide range of Arts and Education programs. The 33,000 sq. ft. building is located on the north edge of the campus and sports a spectacular view of Kamloops. Costing \$5 million, it has been designed with future expansion in mind.

The \$6 million addition to the Science Building will see the addition of two new wings which double the capacity of the existing facility. The east wing will be the new home of the Respiratory Therapy program, new faculty offices, lecture theatres, and additional classroom space. The west wing will contain new laboratories, classrooms and a student lounge.

These additions and expansions, made available through the Access Fund that brought degree granting status in 1989, will complete the first stage of expansion and will total an expenditure of \$15 million. Amazingly, all of these facilities will be full to capacity when the doors open in September!

#### Campus Activity Centre

The recent announcement from the Ministry of Advanced Education, clearing the way for the building of a new Campus Activity Centre at Cariboo, is history in the making and will add a new dimension to student life on campus.

First, the history. Universities have the means to borrow money privately but College and Institutes do not...or rather, did not, until last year. As a result of an initiative by the student society and the College, government was asked to change the legislation so that an activity centre could be built at the College by borrowing money.

That change came last year. A business plan and proposal, based on the entire facility being cost-recovery, was presented by a joint student/college committee. Approximately 6.5 million will be borrowed, and revenues from operations in the centre, plus a student building levy now in place, will retire the debt within 15 years. This approval, along with a \$2 million capital facilities grant previously given to expand food services, will allow construction to begin this fall and the facility will be ready by September 1992.

Approximately 53,000 square feet in size, the building will include lounging areas and games room, bookstore and retail outlets, fast food and full cafeteria services. It will become the social and recreational centre of life on campus and will have a tremendous impact on student life.

The Centre will be a gathering place for many groups and events during the "off-hours" of the academic year. Meeting rooms, food facilities and oncampus housing will make May to August a prime time for the hosting of conferences, conventions and meetings for all occasions. In 1993 it will be the centre of activity for athletes and coaches from across Canada at the Canada Summer Games, providing enough capacity to seat almost 1,000 people. The opening of the activity centre next year will not only enhance the social aspect of student life, but will also create a multi-purpose facility for the entire community.



### PROFILE... Benita Cassar-Torreggiani:

#### Cassar-Torreggiani: A Multi-Dimensional Artist

The next time you thumb through a Vogue, Mademoiselle or any other fashion magazine, you might have Benita Cassar Torreggiani ('71) to thank for the whimsical and magnetizing clothing advertisements filling the pages.

It was twenty years ago when Torreggiani, not long out of Kam High, attended Cariboo College primarily in search of a career path. Here, she was inspired by her Art instructor who encouraged her to think about the possibilities of making a living as an artist. "He told me I had the ability. He was interested enough to give me that extra push over the edge, to build my confidence and give me the courage to go into the arts."

Several years of study at the New York Arts Student League, then at the Fashion Institute of Technology in New York turned raw talent into a portfolio fitting of the competative fashion industry market in the United States, and the hard work paid off.

Moving to Chicago, Torreggiani's first assignment was to do a cover ad for the Chicago Tribune. "I was so nervous about the assignment that I played a Bob Dylan record about 500 times over for inspiration."

Though her reputation as Art Director grew after working for Marshall Field department store in Chicago and freelancing in upstate New York, it was Torreggiani's move to the Big Apple that really launched her career. A photographer friend, whom she had worked with at Bloomingdales's, recommended her to internationally acclaimed fashion designer Ralph Lauren.


After working for Lauren and two department stores as Art Director for several years, Torreggiani took a quantum leap and went into business for herself. She recalls 'being ready for a change after working long hours and sometimes compromising creativity in the process.'

Nonetheless, Torreggiani had ambivalent feelings about launching her own business. "I needed new challenges, but I was also burnt out. I wasn't ready to take on the long hours needed to get things off the ground." After a month in Europe, she returned re-energized and found new and old clients knocking at her door.

Despite her eclectic clientele, busy days and non-stop travelling, Torreggiani is still looking for something different. "I did some graphic design work in Canada for free. I designed a logo for the World Diving Cup Association in Winnipeg and for the Canada Games in Kamloops. I'm hoping those two logos will open doors for more work, but work that pays!"

Torreggiani admits most of the resources for her line of work are in the United States, but she hopes to come back to Canada on a more regular basis.

Torreggiani is also going back to her roots as far as her art goes. "I'm taking a painting class which is for my own enjoyment. I have ideas that are not of commercial value, but that doesn't matter. I feel completely at peace when I'm painting."

Is selling her paintings part of her plans for the future? "My teacher says living off painting becomes a job. I don't want to put any pressure behind it. I would like to give up my present job to paint, but I can't see it happening at this time."

Despite these claims, Torreggiani still values what she is doing in the fashion industry. "Some days when I'm trying to make sense of everything, trying not to go over budget, getting everything and everyone organized and trying to come up with creative ideas I wonder, why me? But


#### Nursing Graduation

#### June Registration

For students of University degree programs, the registration process will begin at Cariboo in June instead of the traditional last two weeks of August. This earlier registration will allow students to make earlier and better decisions. The deadline for application to academic programs was April 15 and almost 3,000 applications were submitted by that date.

Based on the date of application and the number of credits completed to date, notices for registration went out in May with the complete credit course listing for both Fall and Winter semesters. Students will begin registration in person or by telephone early in June. The large group of first year applicants is expected to begin registration in early July.

With registration occurring over a two month period, less than 100 registrations per day are expected to be handled. This will allow for better service and the elimination of the long lineups. Clearly the days of last minute applications are gone!



#### Bachelor of Social Work Arrives

Formally, the Bachelor of Social Work Degree program is arriving at Cariboo this fall, but in reality it has been in operation for a year. Full funding for the degree program wasn't granted until this year, but with the majority of the development work completed prior to last summer, the first classes were launched in September.

The B.S.W. degree is being offering in association with the University of Victoria, the second degree program with UVic now available at Cariboo. With full funding now secured, the program will be hiring a fulltime complement of faculty and has just announced the appointment of Grant Larson as the new Associate Dean. He comes to Cariboo from his previous position as coordinator of the two-year program at Red Deer College in Alberta.

In the "laddered" approach that is being developed as the unique element in the University College model at Cariboo, graduates of some Human Service certificate programs can now qualify for admission to the degree program by completing only a few additional courses rather than one year of academic study that is generally required.


