



### Story of our research goals and process

    - Developmental Social Welfare Paradigm in SA

### Research team


- Research team: Shane Young Jeanette Schmid, Marina Morgenshtern, Jessie Turton
- Aim was 10 participants in each country
  - 15 in Canada interviewed- in South Africa
  - Focus groups: CA- April; SA-May



### The emergent story of the literature review process

- Js developed a draft lit review to contextualize the research questions
- Became formalized as part of partnership process with South Africa and VIU's Dept. of Aboriginal Education
- Questions emerged with sy joining the research team
  - Does this process of knowledge gathering fit with Indigenous research approaches?
  - Does the knowledge gathered highlight alternatives knowledges?
  - What should be used as a foundation going forward?






# The emergent story from the lit review process

Western/Eurocentric/ Anglophone social work

- is inappropriate in many contexts
  - Individualized (vs collective)
  - Ignores structural issues
  - Expensive
- Is harmful
  - Reinforces discrimination and oppression/status quo





# The emergent story from the lit review process

- Different definitions:
  - Indigenizing
  - Indigenous
  - Culturally relevant/Appropriate (not cultural competency)
  - Local
  - Decolonized
  - Ecological
  - Developmental social work







### Contextualized Social Work **Education**

#### An integration that allows

- Recognition of colonization (past; contemporary)
- Integration of micro, mezzo, macro w emphasis on structural factors
- Focus on Indigenous/local helping strategies & knowledges
- Centres local knowledges within the global
- Local meaning is privileged
