Statistical Highlights

- ► Total head count enrolment in Fall 1991, including part-time vocational, international education, and extension services programs, amounted to 6,573, representing a 23% increase over the previous year's enrolment, which did not include part-time vocational and extension services.
- In Fall 1991, head count enrolments increased by 77% in University College degree programs to 548 as compared to Fall 1990 enrolment, and decreased by 3% in University Transfer program.
- 29.6% of the students in 1991/92 enrolled in University Transfer Program while 12.3% enrolled in Career/Technical Programs and 35.5% in Vocational and Extension Services Programs. University College Degree Programs accounted for 8.3% of the total student population. 14.4% of the students were in College. Preparatory/International Education Programs.
- Career/Technical programs experienced a 13% decline in head count enrolment to 944 from 1,036 in Fall 1990 enrolment. Total enrolment in these programs continues on a downward trend following a 3% decrease in Fall 1990 and a 6.6% decline in Fall 1989.
- When compared with the previous year, regular non-vocational programs as a total experienced a slight decline of 0.49%. The decrease is largely due to the effect of declining enrolment in Career/Technical programs.
- The past 3 years, 1989, 1990, and 1991 represent the fastest growth in enrolments. Today, the total University College enrolment has increased by more than 120% over that of 1980. Since the implementation of degree programs in 1989, there has been substantial influx of students into the degree programs over for the last two years.
- For 5 years in a row, female students continue to outnumber male students in non-vocational programs. Fall 1991 data indicated that 60% of the students in these programs were women.
- 62% of the total enrolment in Fall 1991 come from Kamloops area, 31% from the UCC region. Overall, 95% of the students are from BC interior regions.
- Among students of academic programs, 62.9% are in the age group of 18 to 24 while 56.9% of the students in Career/Technical programs are in the same age group. The next largest age group in academic and Career/Technical programs is 25 to 29.
- Of all programs, the average course load per student is 3.67 for Fall 1991. Career/Technical programs have a slightly higher course load average of 4.31 per student while University Transfer program comes second with an average of 3.83 courses per student.
- More than 64% of all first-time full-time non-vocational students who enrolled in UCC in Fall 1991 came straight from high school. 17.8% came from the labour force and less than 10% transferred from other universities and colleges.
- UCC has gained more and more international representation in its student population with 204 international students enrolled in Fall 1991. Of all international students, 97% were from Asian countries and regions.

- Total financial aid and awards to students in 1991/92 amounted to \$6,183,545. The single largest proportion of student aid and awards comes from the BC Student Assistance Program with a total award amount of \$5,616,393 in 1991/92. 54.4% of the 1,946 students who received scholarships, bursaries, prizes and loans were in the BC Student Assistance Program category.
- Percentage change in the number of awards in 1991/92 over the previous year ranged from 10% to over 30%. Of all aid and award categories that experienced decline in number of awards, Emergency Student Loans saw the biggest decline, down almost 70% over the previous year.
- Of all counselling and academic advising activities, telephone contacts, with an average of over 3,500 calls per month, and counter enquiries, with an average of 506 enquiries per month, are the two largest.
- 65% of a total of 278 full-time on-going and temporary faculty as of Fall 1991 were male and 35% female. Male faculty in most divisions outnumber female except in Regional and Developmental, which has a male-to-female ratio of 1 to 2.44. The Division of Sciences and Health Sciences has an almost balanced gender distribution in its faculty : 38 male vs. 37 female.
- 57% of all faculty have a degree above baccalaureate level. 67 (24%) faculty staff have a doctoral degree. Overall, 75% have a university degree.
- UCC's revenue and expenditure are steadily increasing at a rate of more than 24% over the previous fiscal year. Such an increase on a year-to-year basis is the highest since 1988/89.
- As before, the largest source of revenue continues to be provincial government funding, which accounted for 56.8% of the total revenue in fiscal 1991. Tuition fees have been stable over the year, accounting for 13.3% of the total revenue in 1991.
- ► Total operation funds, i.e. funds designated for program support, instructional/student support, institutional support, and temporary funded courses, accounted for 61.6% of the total expenditure in fiscal 1991. As always, faculty and staff salaries take up more than 65% of the total operation funds.
- Capital spending is the second largest category in expenditure, taking up 24% of the total expenditure for fiscal 1991. In the mean time, total capital assets of the University College, when adjusted for inflation, have increased by 27.1% over the previous year. The increases in capital spending and capital asset value can be attributable to the expanding growth of the University College.

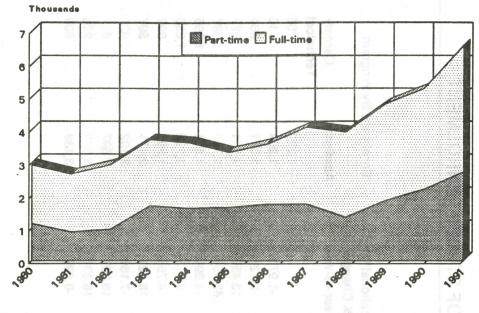

Since 1988, both full-time and part-time head count enrolments have been increasing. In academic year 1991/92, total head count enrolment amounted to 6,573, representing a 22.8% increase over the previous year. The considerable enrolment growth is largely attributable to the influx of students into the University College degree programs, which were implemented in 1989. Total enrolment in University College degree programs alone increased by 77% in 1991/92 over the previous year. On the other hand, total head count enrolment in Career/Technical program saw a decline by 13% in 1991/92, when compared with that of 1990/91.

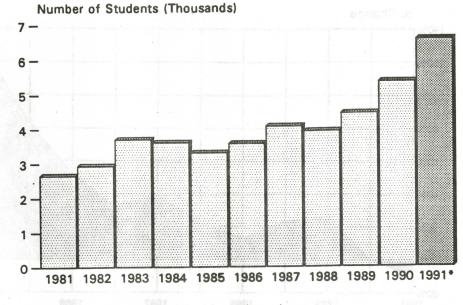
Changes in total head count enrolments on a year-to-year basis have shown some fluctuations. After a decline in 1981, enrolments in 1982 and 1983 picked up quite substantially for two years in a row before they dipped again in 1984 and 1985. Nevertheless, total enrolments have been maintaining an upward trend since 1986.

When enrolment figures are compared with that of 1980, all except in 1981 show definite growth. The past 3 years, 1989, 1990, and 1991 represent the fastest growth in enrolments. Today, the total college enrolment has more than doubled that of 1980.

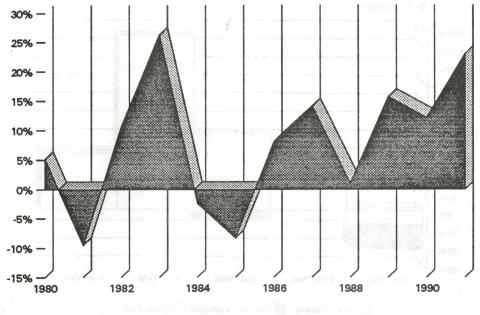
TOTAL HEAD COUNT ENROLMENTS Fall 1981 to Fall 1991

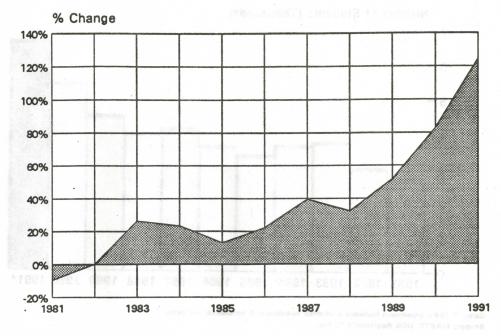


Annual Change as Compared to the Previous Year



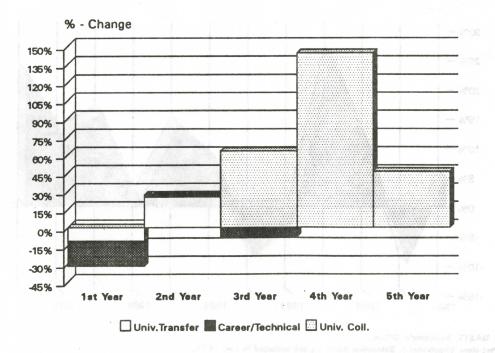

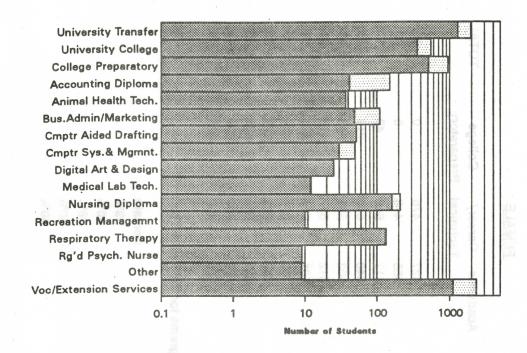

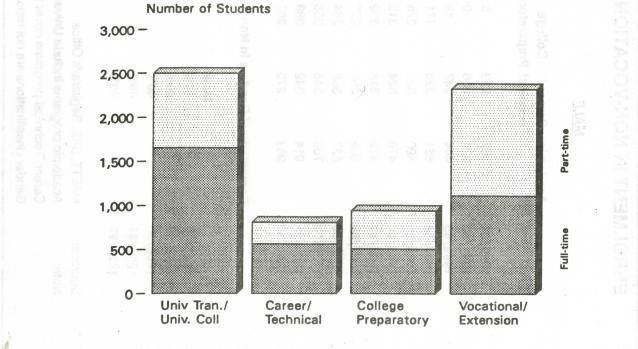
Fall 1991 Enrolment by Major Program

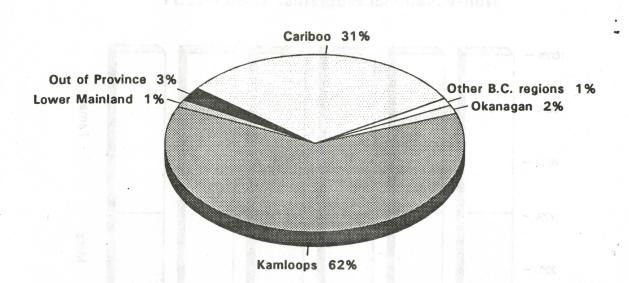

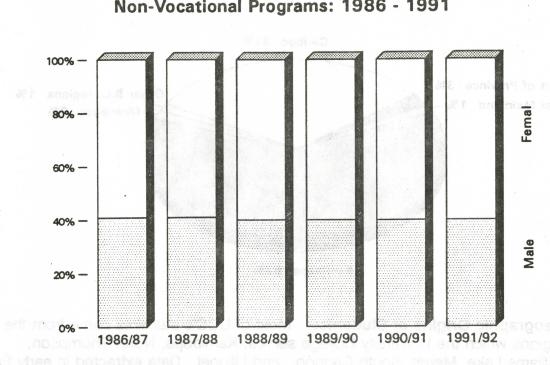
Fall 1991 Enrolment by Permanent Address



Geographic Origins of Students: Most of UCC's students come from the regions which the University College serves: Kamloops, North Thompson, Williams Lake, Merritt, South Cariboo, and Lillooet. Data extracted in early Fall 1991 indicated that 62% of the total head count enrolment came from Kamloops, 31% from the Cariboo region, 4% from other parts of the Province and 3% from out of the Province. This demographic distribution of the student body has been quite consistent for the past few years and has proven that UCC is a major regional university college.

Student Gender Distribution: As for the gender proportions of the student body, existing data show that female students continue to outnumber male students in all major program areas. In Fall 1991, 60% of the total enrolment were women. This phenomenon was also found in numerous age groups, and at both full-time and part-time status. For example, for Fall 1991, there were more women than men in age groups from under 18 to over 40 with either full-time or part-time status in University Transfer, University College, and College Preparatory programs. Similar patterns were located in Career/Technical programs for the same semester.

Age of students: The break-down of age groups of students in all major programs shows that the age 18-24 group is by far the largest one in programs such as the University College, University Transfer, Career/Technical, and College Preparatory. The number of students in this age group, when compared with that of Fall 1990, has inceased by 1.9% in academic programs, and 4.9% in Career/Technical programs.

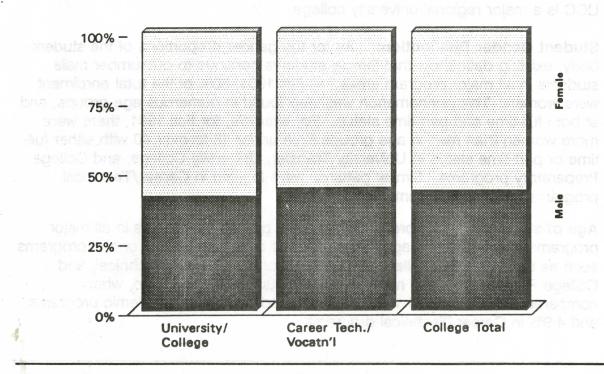


GENDER DISTRIBUTIONS IN ENROLMENT

Non-Vocational Programs: 1986 - 1991

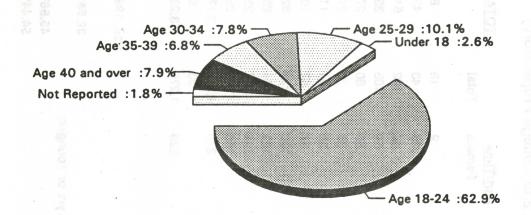

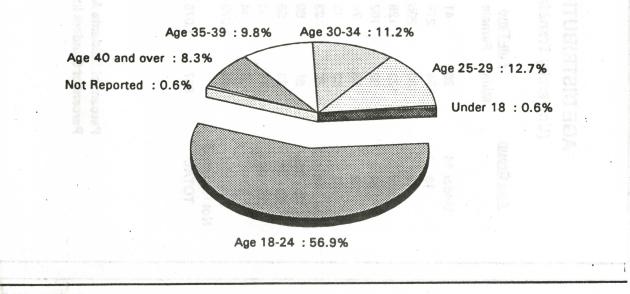

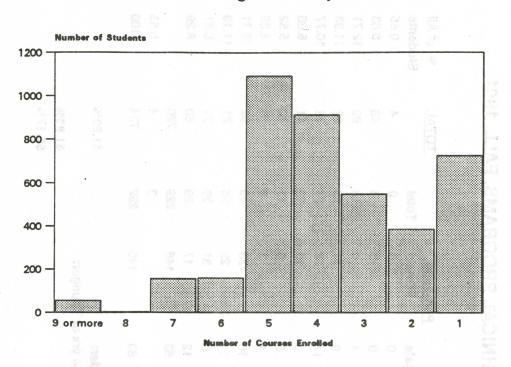

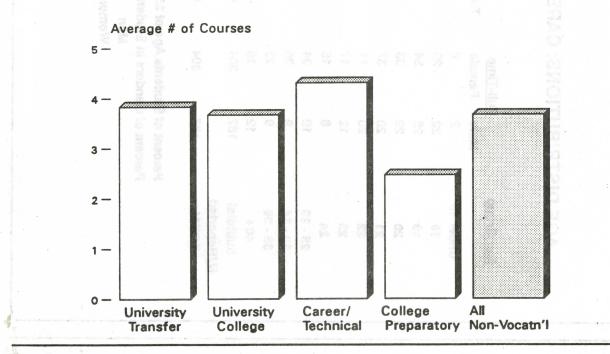
STUDENT WORK LOAD BY NUMBER OF COURSES

AVERAGE COURSE LOAD OF STUDENTS

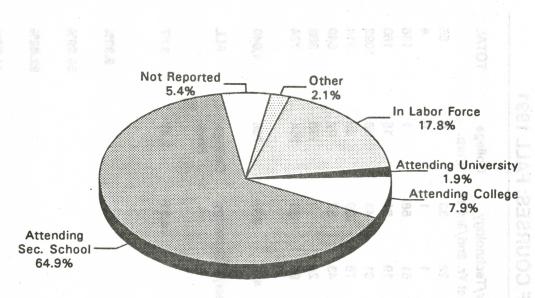
By Program Type: Fall 1991

Main Activities before Attending UCC: Fall 1991 All First-time, Full-time Non-Vocational Students

In non-vocational programs, about 65% of the new full-time students who entered into the first and second years of program in Fall 1991 declared their main activity as attending secondary schools during the same year before going to UCC. This suggests that the majority of new students are fresh high school graduates. On the other hand, 17.8% of the first-time, full-time non-vocational students came directly from the labour force. Less than 10% of the new students were transfer students from other universities and colleges both in and out of the Province.

Of first year new full-time students who entered into programs of University Transfer, Career/Technical, and College Preparatory, close to 75% of them (590 out of 788) attended secondary schools in the Province before they came to the University College.

In another development, the University College has gained more and more international representation in its student population as illustrated by the Fall 1991 international student enrolment data. Among the 204 international students who registered in Fall 1991, about 97% were from Asian countries and regions. This figure does not include short-term summer English language program enrolments, which are predominantly Japanese clients. The growth of international students at UCC has helped generate a revenue of more than one million dollars for 1991/92.

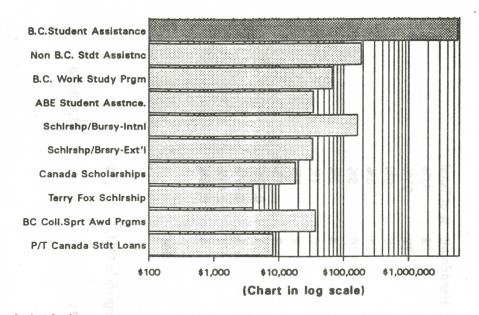

Financial Aid & Awards By Award Type: Total Amount Awarded 1991/92



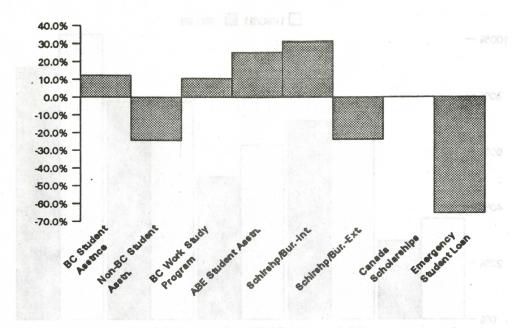

Student Financial Aid & Awards: The single largest proportion of student aid and awards again comes from the BC Student Assistance Program with a total amount of \$5,616,393 in 1991/92. The number of students who received this award item accounted for 54.4% of the 1,946 students who were awarded scholarships, bursaries, prizes and loans in the same academic year. 471 students were recipients of scholarships, bursaries and prizes from both internal and external sources, making them the second largest group with a total award amount of \$197,672. Although only 46 students were awarded the Out-of-Province Student Assistance, the total dollar amount made it the third largest category.

In terms of percentage change in the number of awards in 1991/92 over the previous year, 1990/91, most categories saw an increase in the total number of recipients ranging from less than 10% to over 30%. The number of students receiving Canada Scholarships remained unchanged. Three categories experienced decline in total numbers of awards. They are, respectively, Out-of-Province Student Assistance, External Scholarships, bursaries and prizes, and Emergency Student Loans. Emergency Student Loans saw the biggest decline in award numbers, down almost 70% over the previous year. Only 53 students received these loans in 1991/92, compared with 153 in 1990/91.

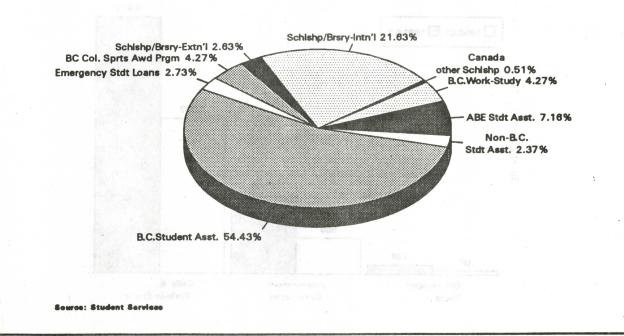
Counselling & Academic Advising: Of all counselling and academic advising activities, telephone contacts are the largest, with an average of over 3,500 calls per month, followed by the counter enquiries with an average of 506 enquiries per month.

Percentage Change in Number of Financial Aid & Awards 1991/92 as Compared to 1990/91

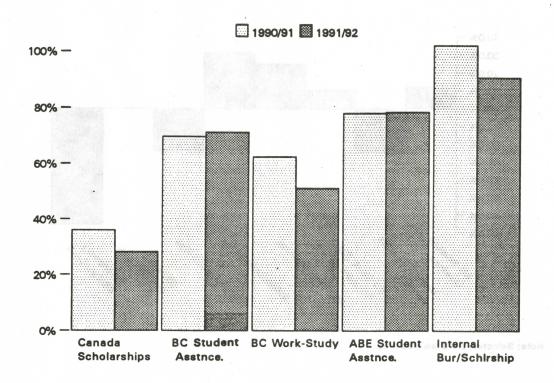

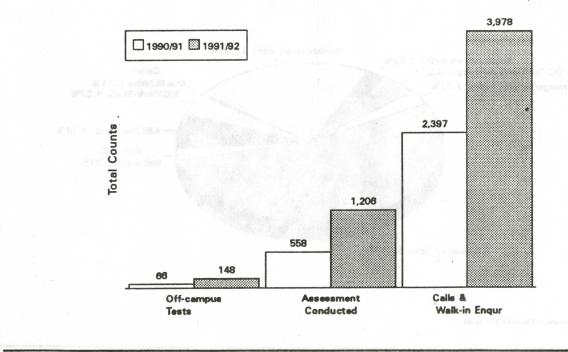
Financial Aid & Award by Percent of Total Number of Students Accepting Aid & Awards: 1991/92

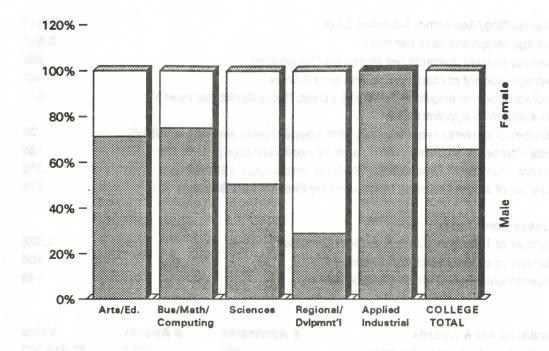

Of a total of 278 full-time on-going and temporary instructional staff as of November 1991, 182 (65%) are male and 96 (35%) female. Male staff tend to outnumber female staff in most divisions except in Regional and Developmental, which has a male-to-female ratio of 1 to 2.44. The Division of Sciences & Health Sciences has an almost balanced gender distribution in its instructional staff: 38 male vs. 37 female. There were no major changes in male-to-female ratio in all divisions as of the time data were compiled. While the number of male staff increased in Fall 1991 over the same period of 1990 in most divisions, only Regional and Developmental has actually achieved an increase in female staff and decline in male staff. As in the previous year, there were no female instructional staff in Applied Industrial Technology Division.

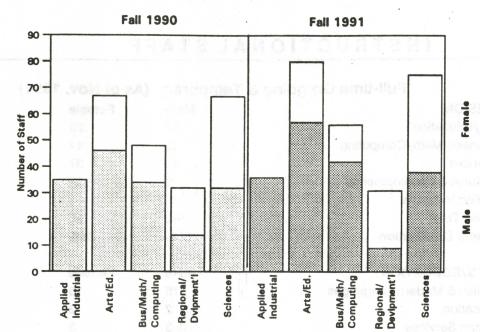
As for academic qualifications of instructional staff, 57% of all faculty staff have a degree above baccalaureate level. Overall, 75% have a university degree.

Of the entire University College personnel (instructional, administrative and support), 70% are employed on a regular on-going basis, 20% on a temporary basis and 7% on an on-going part-time basis. (These figures exclude part-time instructional contracts.)

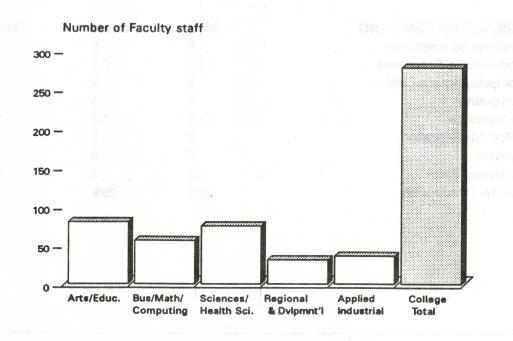

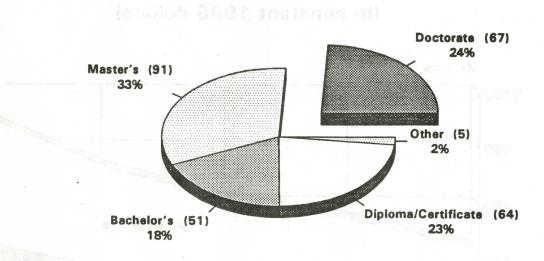

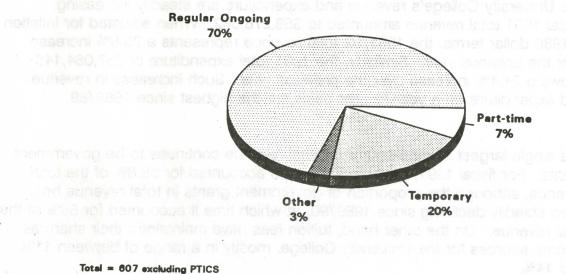

EDUCATIONAL LEVEL OF FACULTY MEMBERS Full-time On-going & Temporary: As of Fall 1991



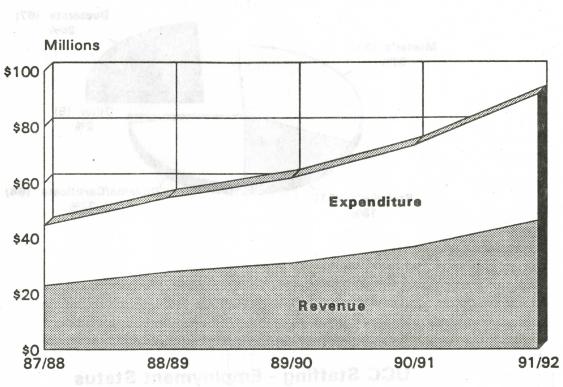
UCC Staffing - Employment Status September 1991 - All Groups

(In constant 1986 dollars)

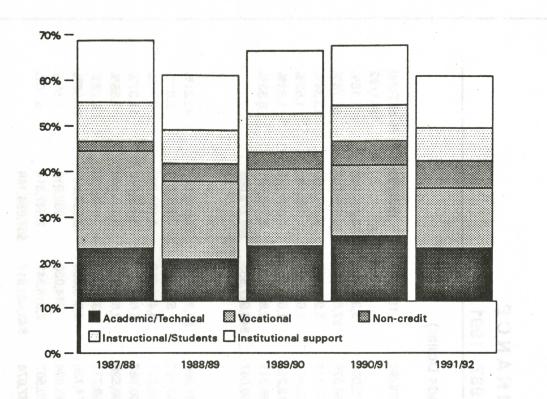

The University College's revenue and expenditure are steadily increasing. Fiscal 1991 total revenue amounted to \$58,276,062. When adjusted for inflation in 1986 dollar terms, the 1991/92 total revenue represents a 25.6% increase over the previous year. Similarly, the 1991 total expenditure of \$57,064,148 shows a 24.4% increase over the previous year. Such increases in revenue and expenditure on a year-to-year basis are the highest since 1988/89.

The single largest income source of total revenue continues to be government grants. For fiscal 1991, government grants accounted for 56.8% of the total revenue, although the proportion of government grants in total revenue has been steadily declining since 1989/90, at which time it accounted for 66% of the total revenue. On the other hand, tuition fees have maintained their share as income sources for the University College, mostly in a range of between 11% and 14%.

The largest portion of expenditure has always been in the program support, which includes operation support to programs in academic, career/ technical, vocational, and non-credit courses. In 1991, program support accounted for 42.2% of the total expenditure. Total operation funds, i.e. program support plus instruction/student support, institutional support, and temporary funded courses, accounted for 61.6% of all expenditures.

As always, faculty and staff salaries take up more than 65% of the total operation expenditures. However, the proportion of salaries in total expenditures for fiscal 1991 has declined slightly when compared with that of the previous year.

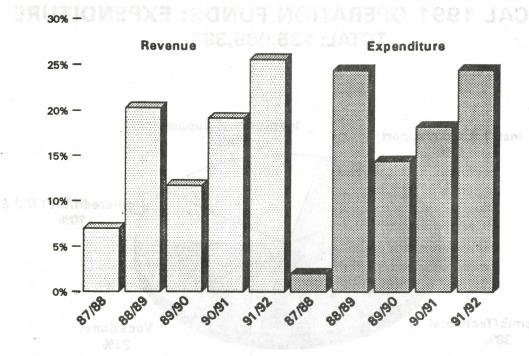

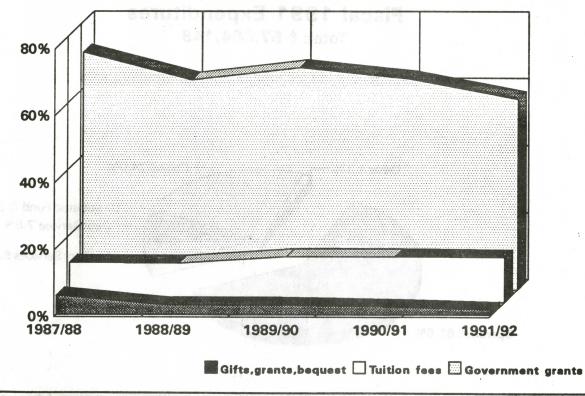
Program & Institutional Supports as % of Total Expenditu

ANNUAL CHANGES IN REVENUES & EXPENDITURES (In Constant 1986 Dollars)

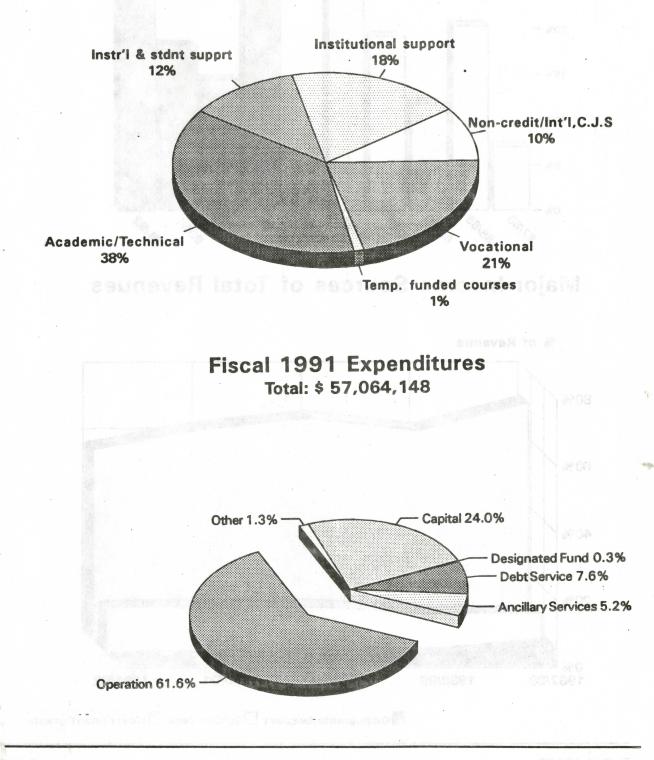


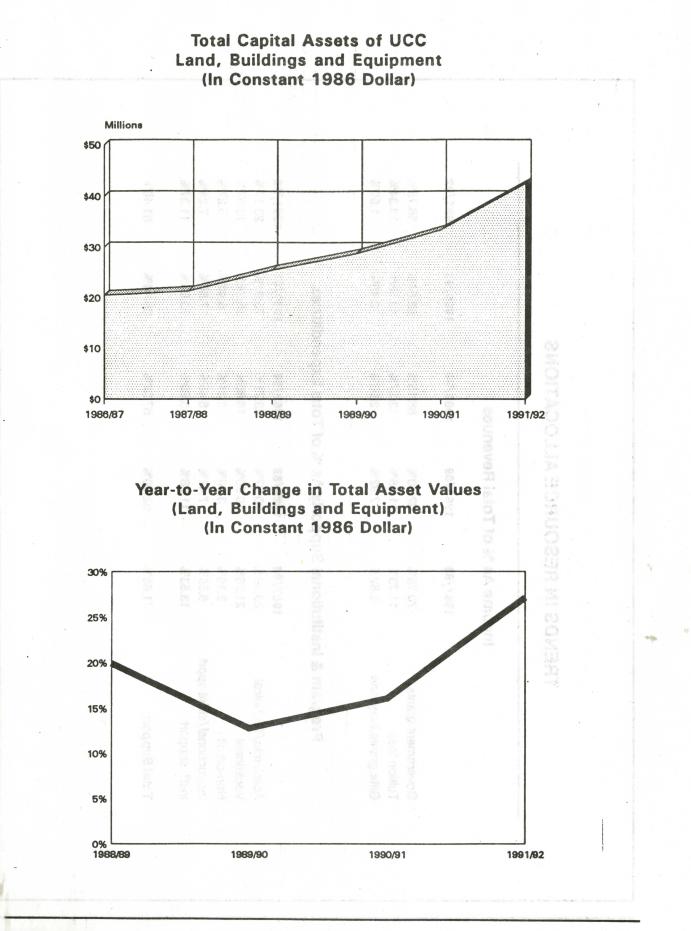
Major Income Sources of Total Revenues

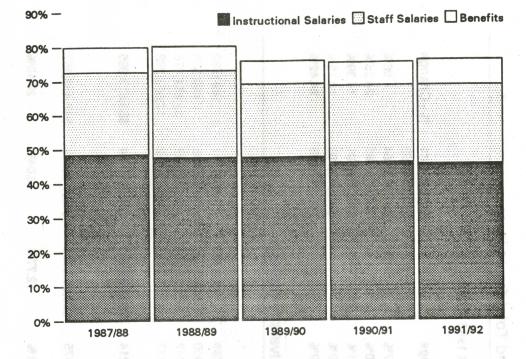

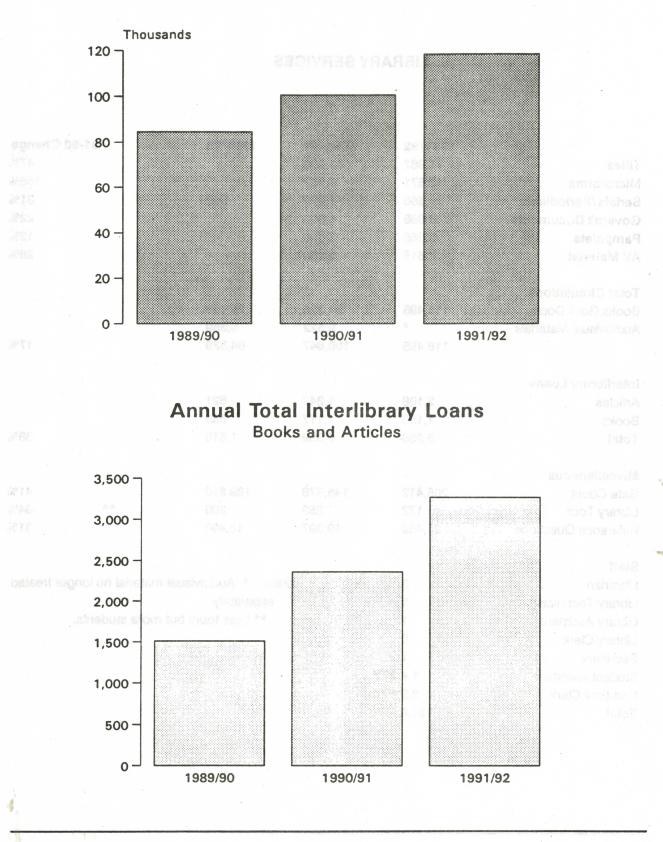
