UNIQUELY AFTERWARD

Things "written exclusively for amateurs" carry with them the tags: for amateur actors, for inexperienced performers, for dabblers, for lousy actors, for not-too-serious groups, for those who dread hard work and challenges!

But as long as the so-termed "amateur" continues to reach for the professional work, my belief will be that there should be no such category as "Plays for Amateurs." Inexperience invariably desires and seeks *experience*. And when it's theatre, the writer must give the play-doer professional work, and let the doer aspire, perspire, and struggle from there — even if the presentation turns out to be amateurish due to legions of reasons. Beginners as well as the experienced are entitled to this respect.

Thus "Revue Unique" is drama fare a la Satirical Revue, a la Cabaret Theatre, a la avant-garde, a la professional, a la little theatre revue, a la a la — designed to strut and fret, puff and sweat, or grace and glow its hour (or more) upon the stage.

It is a work fashioned by one who is perhaps naive and nutty enough to fondly believe that in no field of endeavor, especially in theatre, does one aspire to be an amateur.
