# FIRE SAFETY

There will be a fire alarm in the near future. When there is one, are you sure you know the fire evacuation procedure? Have you read the poster by the door of your classroom? Do you know where the closest exit is? Are you sure you won't panic? Don't act like a coyote in a chicken house, whatever you do.

There have been more people injured in fire safety drills than there have been in a real fire. These injuries are not very often publicized because the injuries are not as seras those experienced in a fire.

Do you know which direction is North? Which direction are you facing now? Where is the closest exit? Now, walk don't run to the nearest exit because you are liable to run into a traffic jam in the stairwill and somebody will either twist an ankle or fall on his head or somewhere important.

Above all, when you reach the stairs take extra caution. You might take the stairs half a step slower so as not to step on some-

body's heel.

As for the main floor there should be an exit close to you. Check to see where it is prior to the alarm.

Let's try to be very cooperative. If things go well, there will be no hassle as far as evacuation procedure goes. But you know how it usually is when there is a fire drill. A lot of people panic. Remember this is just a fire drill and not a real fire. The administration just wants to see how quickly they can evacuate the building in case there really is a fire at some point in time. Lets do it right the first time then we won't have to do it again and again until we do it right.

### JOURNALIST

Power

Much too often, due to the gradual degeneration of modern-day men, the meaning of Power is forgotten. In days of the past, a type of glory cohabited the mind of the powerful Man. He was a man able to guide the formation of his future through the manifestation of his influence over his environment. He was a man who, more often than not, exhibited physical prowess, indicative of the fact that Power was an intrinsic quality of his life-pattern. Inherently, he was the personification of Godliness exhuming the very values attributed to God-doin. People involved in a frenzy of over-simplification, often demonstrate a failure to appreciate that the Power of expression is frequently enhanced through the greater comprehension of sentential analysis. Too, I would venture to state tentatively that a phrase, which might commonly be dismissed as a form of euphuim, is in actuality simplified, since it relates its meaning in a fashion which is more concise and condensed. Power is akin to muscular strength; it can be worked for-built-up-meaning that its attainment becomes simpler, leading one to search for exercises" more befitting ones capacity. More, caution must be adhered to, lest corruption leads a Powerful Man to his down fall through the amlpractice of Power exertion. The true strength of any individual lies not in the mere wielding of power but in understanding what constitutes its components. In the early 1960's Batista's

dictators hip was an

overt expression of

authority but withen a year a man recognizing the basis of this rule and understanding the strength of simple desires was able to expose the weakness of the regime, and Castro with his rustic habits, attire and speech grasped the reins of power. Not only is this ultimate of strength true in the field of political ascesion but also in science, theology, philosophy and even language itself. (The latter of which is after all primarily a means of communication rather than intimidation) To communicate with others on equal planes of understanding is commendable but to present sophisticated ideas in a manher understood by those educated less than oneself shows the true marks of understanding and power.
