SOUTH EAST ASIAN TOUR

The Southeast Asia Educational Travel Program being arranged by Cariboo College is meeting a very favourable response. Charles Mossop, Instructor in Anthropology and Asian Studies at Cariboo and organizer of the Progam said today that there have been sufficient applications to insure that the Program will go ahead as planned: "We have participants from Kamloops, Savonna and Williams Lake and they are all people of widely differing ages, personal backgrounds and interests, he said. Mr. Mossop added, however, that there are still some places available in the group and he would welcome further inquiries from people in the College region.

The program involves a series of lectures and seminars on Southeast Asia beginning in February, 1975. On May 4, 1975 the group will leave Kamloops for a three-week tour of Southeast Asia visiting such places as Hong Kong, Singapore, Indonesis, Bali, Malaysia and Thailand. The cost of the program is \$1695.00 and this includes virtually everything except some meals and expenses of a personal nature. Mr. Mossop pointed out that this figure represents a considerable saving over the cost of taking such a tour as an individual.

Penal Changes?

The English department of B.T.S.D. program has been occasionally holding debates. The debates have covered many topics, ranging from Capital Punishment to Mercy Killing. The classes compete for the "Nick Martin Trophy", donated by the welders.

A very informative and challenging debate took place between two B.T.S.D. classes Friday Nov. 29.

Jim Bray's class took the negative approach to the question of changing the penal system. The opposition, Al Buchanan's class supported the question.

The debate proved terribly interesting, because of first hand information.

A.D. Buchanan's team consisted of three inmates from K.R.C.C. Peniteniary now on Educational Release.

The other member was very outspoken in terms of changes, Also from Jim Bray's team came an expriot squader, who participated in holding down the Kingston Peniteniary Riot.

To say the least, the debate was revealing. The inmates introduced information about food and living conditions at the prison. A detailed report on punishment for misconduct was also presented by an inmate Tim Quinn, the ex-member of the riot squad, stated that upon visiting Kingston Peniteniary, he felt that the food was excellent and he saw no need for changes, at least not for the better. John Charlie, David Marrelli, Ed Yetter and Dan McKinnon argued that here at K.R.C.C. it was a different story.

The crowd of about sixty students proved to be enthused and very interested in the debate. The decision on whose presentation was superior was done democratically by students voting by secret ballots.

The ultimate decision gave A.D. Buchanan's class, the team wanting penal changes, an unanemous decision over Jim Bray's team. crowd's opinion during the debate swayed in support of the inmates, who presented their case clearly and well. Jim Bray's team is to be commended although they tended to attack the statements of the opposition rather than to present facts of their own. These debates draw great attention in the B.T.S.D. department, and prove helpful in improving . oral English ability.

Team members were, the victorious team of John Charlie, David Marrelli and Ed Yetter, the inmates and Dan McKinnon a very impressive public speaker. The opposing team consisted of Tim Quinn, Joan Hall, Al Ackles, and Kieth Woods. A debate on the "Five Year Marriage Contract" will be held Wednesday Dec. 11.


BOYS:



POLITICAL FORUM

"We have enough M.P.'s already" says Don Couch, local P.C. Candidate in the last federal election, taking issue with the Liberal Government's latest redistribution proposal.

After meeting with B.C.'s 13 P.C. M.P.'s here in Kamloops a week ago, Don had a preview of the arguments which arose in the House of Commons during the past week.

The B.N.A. Act requires that after each of Canada's decennial censuses (last one was in 1971) the seats in the House of Commmons are redistributed to reflect population changes. The proposal made in 1972 would addmore seats to Ontatio and B.C. and take away from several provinces including Quebec.

WOMEN

Stop for a moment and think about your relationship with your doctor. How much help does a women expect when she discusses her gynecological problems with her physcian? With what respect do doctors regard their female patients' ills?

An important ommission, common to many doctors, is failure to explain what is going on inside their patients body. Not much information is made available (by doctors) about the controversial issues. We are expected to have faith in the prescribed treatments and birth control methods.

We should be encouraged to read books such as <u>Our Bodies Our Selves</u> and <u>Free and Female</u>, which tell us the unbiased biological facts.

Instead we depend on the painful experience of trial and error, and other womens personal experiences, Often more reliable advice can be had from someone who has "been through it".

P.C.'s allege that for political reasons, the Liberals have come up with a new proposal which would add 3 seats to Quebec's 1972 allowance, but only 1 more to B.C.'s Quebce is, of course, the key to the Liberals strength, and B.C. is now becoming a P.C. stronghold.

The latest Liberal move would add 16 more seats to the existing 264 by the next federal election. It is projected there would be 352 in the year 2001.

"Having become fairly involved in politics the past couple of years, I agree with the suggestion that Canada is overgoverned now and does not need to increase the size of its government" said Don.

The latter is essentially the philosophy of the Vancouver Women's Health Booklet. It states "Women, especially, often feel powerless and unhappy with their doctors. They see getting good medical care as a matter of luck."

The results of a health survey in the Vancouver Area have allowed A Woman's Place(publishers of the booklet) to: compile a Directory of Doctors (recommended by other women), assess the health needs of women, and summarize the health facilities available. (From hospitals which encourage mother-father participation in natural childbirth, to free clinics for V.D. treatment, and recommended reading material.) Also included in the booklet are short, informative summaries and some illustrations of I.U.D.'S, tubal ligations, child-birth practices, nutrition, and much more.
