Annual Awards Ceremony

At least 100 donors who sponsor scholarships, bursaries and endowment funds were on hand to congratulate students at the Annual Awards Ceremony, a joint effort of the UCC Foundation and the UCC Financial Aid & Awards Office, held on November 24th. This fall, 362 students received 372 scholarships and bursaries totalling \$190,000 to help to finance their post-secondary studies.


"The tremendous support of our annual donors and interest from our endowment funds makes a great difference in affordable education at UCC for hundreds of students," explains UCC Foundation Executive Director Kathleen Biagioni.

Creators of an endowment fund effectively double their money right away. Endowments, which are funds established by an initial gift of \$5000 or more, are matched by the provincial government. Companies and unions have established endowment funds to honour individuals who have made outstanding contributions. Families also create an endowment fund in the memory of a loved one who has passed away. Community organizations set up endowments to support students working in a particular area of study.

This year, ten students received scholarships and bursaries through the UCC Alumni Association Endowment Fund, one of UCC's largest endowments, created and funded by former UCC students. Another endowment, the Bill Dansey Endowment Fund, funds up to six annual bursaries for students in Horticulture, Animal Health Technology, or Natural Resource Science.

Each year, the Foundation holds various events to raise funds for badly needed student awards. In early November, fifteen community businesses, associations and individuals pledged donations totalling \$240,000 at the Foundation's 11th Annual Fundraising Campaign Kick-Off Breakfast, bringing the year's fundraising total to \$420,000, just \$230,000 short of the Foundation's \$650,000 annual goal. Other fundraisers held by the Foundation include last month's Oktoberfest, which raised \$7,000. Watch for details on the Foundation Gala, to be held February 26th, 2000.

Williams Lake Campus Site Update

After an 18-month slope stability analysis undertaken by the engineering firm, Golder and Associates, a remedial treatment involving nine vertical pumped wells to reduce groundwater pressure at the site has been recommended.

The City of Williams Lake and other stakeholders in the area, including UCC, BC Rail, and several government ministries, are now seeking provincial government funding in order to proceed with the remediation project.

UCC is moving ahead with an engineering survey of the existing campus building on Hodgeson Road in order to determine the full extent of the damage, and to ascertain whether renovations and/or rebuilding are required once the area is stabilized.

Over twenty alternative campus sites have been identified through an extensive public consultation process, and UCC will share details of these site location suggestions with the public and the UCC community, whether or not it is necessary to find a new permanent campus site.

UCC Strategic Plan

The UCC Strategic Planning Steering Committee has prepared the final draft of their Green Paper: *Building on Strengths and Uniqueness—A Strategic Plan for The University College of the Cariboo, 2000-2005.* The plan has been forwarded to Education Council for their examination and approval.

Alumni Association Project Grants

The UCC Alumni Association awarded \$3090 in Project Grants for the fall semester. Recipients are: UCC Kamloops Wildlife Park Docents, \$300 to create a Docent Resource Library; School of Business, \$270 to assist with travel costs for a visiting professor; Just Wash 'Em Program, \$150 to purchase a kit for nursing students to use in a handwashing awareness program for primary school students; BNRS student, \$250 to help with travel expenses for a co-op term

in Paraguay; \$300 for the purchase of another Athletic Alumni Banner for the Gymnasium; Geography students, \$100 to help with travel expenses for a trip to the annual Canadian Association of Geographers meeting; UCC Art Gallery Committee, \$390 to pay for signage for exhibitions; UCC Friends of the Gardens, \$580 for start-up funds to exhibit, preserve and expand UCC's plant inventory; Don Lawrence, \$150 to help with shipping costs to send an artwork to an artist-run gallery in Montreal; Canadian Studies, \$300 to help with expenses related to bringing Mary Walsh of This Hour Has 22 Minutes to campus for Canadian Studies Day: PHP, \$300 to help with travel costs to bring a guest speaker to campus.

UCC To Host National Adventure Tourism Conference

As one of Canada's leading providers of post-secondary tourism education, UCC will host ATC 2000: an Adventure Tourism conference specifically designed for adventure tourism operators and institutions offering adventure programs.

From February 11 to 13, 2000, delegates from all regions of Canada will gather at the main UCC campus in Kamloops to share ideas, discuss common issues, and attend workshops on such topics as risk management planning, post-incident strategies, land access and permitting, marketing, waivers and liability. Special workshops for educators, covering program development and evaluation, are also included.

UCC's Continuing Education Department celebrated the Grand Opening Wednesday, November 17th, of its new Continuing Education Centre, now centrally located in Room 1412 in Old Main.

Continuing Education administrator Donna Mason says that with the new venue and reorganization of UCC Continuing Education, customer service is centralized, making it much easier for community members to access courses for upgrading or interest.

"Continuing Education means so much more nowadays," explains Donna. "We're way beyond flower arranging and bookkeeping. The workplace requires educated employees, and many students enrolled in our programs are there because they work, and can only attend classes because of our flexible class times, or they're from an outlying community with few opportunities for advancement."

Courses run under UCC Continuing Education include such specialized interest courses as Festive Holiday Dinners (Food 035) or Equine First Aid (Equa 040), as well as credit courses in computing, forestry, horticulture, business, tourism, nursing, languages, and trades and technology. Classes may be held at UCC's main campus in Kamloops, at its satellite campus in Williams Lake, at regional centres located in Ashcroft, Lytton, Lillooet, Clinton, Chase, Clearwater, Barriere, and 100 Mile House, or delivered onsite at mills, factories, or community halls.

Nursing Students' Poster Projects

Nurses can and do influence change! That was the message, as well as the assignment, for a class of fourth-year Bachelor of Science in Nursing students this year.

Now these students are showing the world how nurses can foster positive changes in community health. On November 18th and 25th, nursing students gathered to explain their

"poster projects," which describe work they've done with various social agencies and other health professionals to raise awareness and facilitate improvements to health programs here and elsewhere.

Some topics presented include: marketing complementary therapies workshops; developing a newsletter to facilitate communication among community health agencies; increasing awareness about organ donation; recruiting nurses to volunteer at the New Life Mission; and organizing and promoting an eating disorders teleconference.

The course was designed to teach students about leadership, influencing change, politics, advocacy, media relations and social marketing.
