

KAMLOOPS AND THE CARIBOO

The main University College campus is in Kamloops, a city of 68.000 at the centre of the southern Interior of B.C.

Superb summers, four dramatic seasons, sports and outdoor recreation, and a diversity of cultural activity that few small cities can match are among the attractions of Kamloops.

UCC territory includes Merritt and the Nicola Valley, Clearwater and the North Thompson, Lillooet and the upper Fraser Canyon, and the historic region known as the Cariboo, where the name originates. At the Williams Lake campus, in the heart of the Cariboo, students can begin study in degree programs, or choose various Career and Trades program options.



With a population of nearly 6,000 students, UCC has doubled in size since becoming a four-year University College in 1989. Our long-term plan envisions a campus that will be home to 10,000 -11,000 students by the end





International Students from around the world are eligible to attend UCC, providing they meet academic requirements and possess a valid student permit.

STUDENT HOUSING

Students can live on campus in one of the 300 single units in the McGill Student Housing complex. Adjacent to the campus, new developments offer shared-accommodation or apartments.

The McGill Student Housing facility is privately owned and operated. Interested students should make direct contact as soon as possible each year by calling McGill Student Housing at (604) 372-7778.

ON CAMPUS

The most striking feature for the first time visitor is the true campus environment of UCC, overlooking the city, in a landscaped setting usually found at older, traditional universities.

Beyond the classroom, we believe that quality facilities and activities for students are an essential part of the experience of postsecondary education.

Our new Campus Activity Centre provides a social, cultural and recreational gathering place at the heart of the campus. The gymnasium, Hillside Stadium track & field complex, and the Canada Games indoor 50-metre pool offer recreational and varsity athletic programs and facilities that are not available at any other college or university in the Interior.

Films, music, theatre, cultural events, lecture series, student clubs, intramural sports and many other student activities are now a regular part of the exciting new University College experience.

ADMISSION

Complete details on admissions policy and prerequisites are found in the UCC Calendar.

The basic educational requirement for Academic/Degree programs and the majority of Career/Technology programs is completion of B.C. Grade 12 (or equivalent) with a minimum average in English 12.

Beyond this, each program area has specific course prerequisites or recommendations. Requirements for Vocational programs vary from Grade 10 - 12 minimum, but graduation from high school is recommended in all cases.

First Year Academic, and a number of Career and Vocational program admissions are determined on a "first applied, first admitted" basis for qualified applicants, based on the date by which all application requirements have been met.

Upper Level Degree entry, plus many Career program admissions are based on an established selective process, using GPA standing and/or other criteria.

Admissions Interviews and/or pretesting is frequently a part of the admissions process.

Mature Student Status for admission is considered for anyone 20 years of age or older, and out of school at least three years. Grade level requirements will be waived for mature students, but individual course prerequisites must be met. College Preparation courses allow students to upgrade and meet prerequisites for entry to UCC programs.

ACADEMIC YEAR

Most programs are semesterized and follow these time patterns: Fall Semester: Sept. - December Winter Semester: January - April

Some vocational programs offer starting dates on the first Monday of each month, or on

predetermined dates three or four different times during the year. Check with the admissions office. Your program of choice may be available sooner than you expected.

SUMMER SESSION

A growing number of university credit courses are now offered in six-week or 12-week Summer Session programs. Details are available in the spring, with registrations following the Winter Semester exam period.

Summer Semester I: May - June Summer Semester II: June - July


AVERAGE COSTS


Through the Awards Office students should apply for the growing number of scholarships, bursaries and awards being established through our UCC Foundation.


