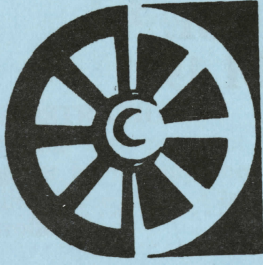

GRADE 12 EQUIVALENCY EXAMINATION

For adults who did not graduate from secondary school. The grade 12 Equivalency Examination, known also as the General Education Development (GED) Test, is an opportunity for those adults to earn an official document stating that they have a Grade 12 equivalency standing. This document may assist them in qualifying for better jobs, for promotions within their own organizations and in applying for admission to post-secondary institutions. Applicants must meet the following requirements. Minimum age of 19, six months residence in B.C.; out of school at least one full year.

Deadline for applications is April 10, 1981. Study manuals and applications are obtainable at the College and at Ogden Sr. Secondary School. The cost of a Study Manual is \$8.00.

Exam will be written April 25, 1981 at Ogden Sr. Secondary School and April 25, 1981 at Cariboo College, Williams Lake.

VOCATIONAL FULL-TIME PROGRAMS - WILLIAMS LAKE

BOOKKEEPING PROGRAM

J. DeMinvielle

The Commercial Bookkeeping Skills Program has been designed to provide a vocational training for bookkeepers or accountants. Graduates of this program usually enter the field of employment in a junior capacity and

gradually progress to the intermediate and senior positions through initiative, on the job experience, and further evening studies with the Society of Registered Industrial Accountants.

Admission requirements: *Grade 11 or mature student status.*

Course Length: *5 months commencing February 2, 1981.*

Course Fee: *\$100.00 and approx. \$75.00 for textbooks, or Canada Manpower sponsorship.*

CLERK-TYPIST PROGRAM

This course offers the student the possibility of training as a clerk-typist or stenographer with some experience in bookkeeping. Course includes: Business Communications, Business machines, Office procedures, Typing and Dicta typing and Introduction to Bookkeeping.

Admission Requirements: *Grade 10 or mature student status.*

Course Length: *5 months, commencing February 2, 1981. 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.*

Course Fee: *\$100.00 plus approximately \$75.00 for textbooks or Canada Manpower sponsorship.*

DINING ROOM AND RESTAURANT COOKING

This course is designed to update people with some experience in the food industry. It provides training in the various subject areas involving a four-week period per subject. This course will help to round off your knowledge should you have a special interest or need in any area of cooking.

Examples of subject areas are:

- Preparing, cooking and serving stocks, sauces and soups.
- Preparing, cooking and serving meat and poultry.
- Preparing, cooking and serving seafood.
- Applying safety and accident prevention procedures.
