It was on March 20, 1989 that the Ministry of Advanced Education officially announced the granting of University College status to Cariboo, and began the evolutionary process taking place today.

Five full university degree programs were added in 1989, a sixth added in 1990 and a seventh in 1991. In 1991, the annual Convocation ceremony awarded the first 25 university graduates who were awarded degrees on June 15, 1991 at the annual Convocation ceremony. Over 1,400 graduates of Certificate, Diploma and Degree programs were recognized in ceremonies held at the college. This new comprehensive post-secondary institution.

Two major two-story projects were completed by September 1991. The Library and Science Buildings were the first in line, with about 70% of the new Arts & Education Building now open. Phase II which will double the building is scheduled for completion for September 1993.

At the heart of the 250-acre campus is the new Cariboo Student Centre, a 53,000 square foot facility that provides centrally located food service, and many other services and facilities for the entire University College community. It opened at the end of the Fall 1992 semester.

As part of the 1993 Canada Summer Games to be held in Kamloops, two major athletic facilities are also under development. The existing athletic fields have seen the addition of an international standard, rubberized track, and now are the addition of Hillside Stadium grandstands facilities. Now in the stadium, the 30,000-seat indoor Canada Games pool began construction in early 1992. Both facilities will provide new athletic and recreation opportunities for all students and staff at U.C.

More facilities additions are in the early planning stages. The new campus development plan now in progress includes the new Applied Industrial Technology Building, the new Cariboo Student Centre, and complete renovation of the existing track & areas of the new facilities are in progress. Yesterday and Today

Established in 1970, Cariboo came into being as the result of a merger between the society seeking to establish the college, and the planned Kamloops Vocational school then under construction on this site. The first year of operation was at the Kamloops Indian Residential School, while the "Main" building was expanded to house both trades and the academic programs that would together make up the new College.

The College officially moved to its present location in 1971, where the Main Building and Cafeteria were surrounded by sand and sagebrush. The library was added in 1975, and at the end of the decade both the Science building and Gymnasium were built. It was another nine years before the next major growth, with the addition of a classroom block to the second floor of the Main building, and the opening of the Clocktower Building and Theatre in 1989.

It was on March 20, 1989 that the Ministry of Advanced Education officially announced the granting of University College status to Cariboo, and began the evolutionary process taking place today.

Five full university degree programs were launched in 1989, a sixth added in 1990 and a seventh in 1992. The first 35 university graduates were awarded degrees on June 15, 1991 at the annual Convocation Ceremonies, where over 1,000 graduates of Certificate, Diploma and Degree programs were recognized in ceremonies that exemplified this new comprehensive post-secondary institution.

Three major new facility projects were completed for September 1991. The Library and Science Buildings were doubled in size, and phase I of the new Arts & Education Building was opened. Phase II which will double this building is scheduled for completion for September 1993.

At the centre of the 250 acre campus is the new Campus Activity Centre, a 53,000 square foot facility that provides greatly enhanced food services, and many other new services and facilities for the entire University College community. It opened at the end of the Fall 1992 semester.

As part of the 1993 Canada Summer Games to be held in Kamloops, two major athletic facilities are also under development. The existing athletic fields have seen the addition of an international standard, rubberized track, and may see the addition of Hillside Stadium grandstand facilities. Next to the stadium, the 50-metre indoor Canada Games pool began construction in early 1992. Both facilities will provide new athletic and recreation opportunities for all students and staff at UCC.

More facilities additions are in the early planning stages, based on the long range campus development plan now in place. They include a new Applied Industrial Technology complex, a new Daycare Centre, and complete renovation of the existing trades areas once those new facilities are completed.

As UCC continues to grow, it is evolving towards independent university status, through changes in provincial legislation that would allow the institution to offer exciting new degrees and other professional programs based on the unique, comprehensive nature of the University College.

A New Identity



As part of the process of change and evolution, the new University College is reflected in a new logo and visual identity program.

The logo of The University College of the Cariboo is comprised of a shield and a logotype. The shield is composed of a sunrise/sunset representative of the area,

where we average over 2000 hours of sunshine annually, and of the rising sun of enlightenment, associated with higher education.

The mountains in the shield are indicative of the terrain of the region, strategically located between the Coast and Rocky Mountain ranges.

The intersecting lines symbolize the coming together of "College" and "University" into a unique entity, as well as being geographic representations of the major rivers, highways and railroads that meet within the boundaries of this region.

The colours, red and purple, reflect both the natural terrain of the area and the new boldness indicative of this University College.

Program Offerings

Career/Technology Certificate or Diploma programs: Nearly 40 different program options, ranging from Health Science professions (with post-graduate options) to Accounting and Computer specialties.

High tech electronics technician program, the CADD program and the Co-operative Education Centre are included in this Division.

In 1989 — In conjunction with the National Research Council of Canada (NRC), the hiring of an Industrial Technology Advisor based at UCC to assist local industry in the transfer of technology.

June 1989 — The completion of a \$5.2 million project that included new general purpose classrooms facilities for Adult Basic education, and new administration and faculty offices and 210 seat theatre in the Clocktower Building.

September 1989 — The construction and opening of the private sector "McGill Student Housing" complex, with 206 units built on campus.

September 1990 — An additional 94 units of student housing constructed to bring total capacity to 300 units.

September 1989 — The addition of a science laboratory to the Williams Lake campus to allow for a full first year academic program to be offered there.

September 1990 — The start of a full three year RN Nursing program in Williams Lake.

September 1991 — The completion of three major facility expansions or additions:

- a \$4 million doubling of the Library
- a \$6 million to doubling of the Science Building
- a \$5 million Arts & Education building.

February 1992 — The start of construction on an \$8.7 million Campus Activity Centre, based on self financing rather than government grants.

Summer Sessions

From a modest beginning of a dozen courses offered in 1990, the demand for summer courses has grown to new records each year. Over 60 courses were offered in the 1992 Summer Session, attracting almost 1,000 students. Expectations are that summer session offerings will continue to expand the number of courses offered, and the number of student enrolments.

Facilities Development

Student Centre: Through a College initiative, an \$8.7 million Campus Activity Centre provides space and services for the student and staff population. The Centre opened in January 1993.

Athletic Community: As part of the 1993 Canada Summer Games to be hosted by the City of Kamloops, Cariboo will be site of the 'athletes village' and location of two major facilities:

Hillside Stadium: Featuring a full international standard facility for track and field, with an all-weather track surface, and two grass fields.

Aquatic Centre: Full international standard aquatic centre with 50-meter pool and diving facilities. Both will be multi-use community athletic facilities.

Industry Liaison

Support for local economic development is a major part of the university college mandate, and is expanding in many new directions.

Through the presence of the NRC Industrial Technology Advisor on campus, many research and development needs in the region are being matched with faculty expertise, student project-work and the financial support of NRC-IRAP programs.

The need for continued awareness of the practical applications of programs is supported by Program Advisory Committees in place for many programs. Made up of employers, industry experts and others from the community, they serve to ensure training is relevant to current industry practices and are responding to new developments in technology.

International Education

As part of the growing global marketplace and the interests of British Columbia, UCC has made a clear commitment to increase international activity. This includes students from all parts of the world studying at UCC, student exchange and faculty exchange programs, accreditation agreements with schools in other countries, and programs being delivered on a contract basis by UCC faculty, in various locations worldwide.

The highly successful International Education department now has over 250 international students from 18 different countries studying at UCC, local students overseas on exchange, accreditation agreements with schools in the Pacific Rim, and is delivering education and training programs directly to students and clients in a number of Pacific Rim countries. All International Education activities are based on full cost-recovery or revenue generation. International student tuition fees are \$6,380 per year, as these students are paying the full cost of their education. Revenues from the overall International Education program allow UCC to create MORE classroom capacity for local students - contrary to any suggestion that international students take space away.

The University College of the Cariboo is evolving towards independent university status, which would be achieved through a change to provincial legislation.

This would allow UCC to begin designing and delivering new degree programs in our own name, and to respond more rapidly to specific needs of the interior region.
