A Comprehensive University-College

- Founded in 1970 —still "legally incorporated" as Cariboo College
- Moved to present campus in 1971
- Serves a geographic region of 60,000 square miles
- Granted four-year university-college status in 1989

Program Offerings

Degree programs: Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Education (Elementary), Bachelor of Business Administration, Bachelor of Social Work and Bachelor of Science in Nursing, and Bachelor of Natural Resource Science.

Career/Technology Certificate or Diploma programs, offering 39 different program options, ranging from Health Science professions (with post-graduate options) to Accounting and Computer specialties.

Applied Industrial Technology training offering Pre-employment and Apprenticeship training in Electrical and Mechanical trades. Two other trades options, offer carpentry, welding, cook training, meatcutting. High tech electronics technician program, the CADD program and the Co-operative Education Centre are included in this Division.

Developmental Programs, offering literacy training, English as a Second Language, high school completion, Adult Special Education and Adult Basic Education programs, and College preparation courses.

Extension Services courses throughout the region, with a network of community coordinators and local facilities offering credit and non-credit courses.

Students

Student Profile

Enrolments in academic programs alone over the past two years have increased by 40%. Almost 3,000 academic students now enrol in programs leading to university degrees.

Recent Highlights

In 1989/90 the launch of five (5) degree programs with Provincial Universities:

- Bachelor of **ARTS** - U.B.C.
- Bachelor of **SCIENCE** - U.B.C.
- Bachelor of **EDUCATION** (Elementary) - U.B.C.
- Bachelor of **BUSINESS STUDIES** - S.F.U.
- Bachelor of **SCIENCE IN NURSING** - UVIC

In 1990/91, the addition of a sixth degree program:

- Bachelor of **SOCIAL WORK** - UVIC

In 1989 — In conjunction with the National Research Council of Canada (NRC), the availability of an Industrial Technology Advisor, based at UCC to assist local industry in the transfer of technology.

June 1989 — The completion of a \$5.2 million project that included new general purpose classrooms and new facilities for Adult Basic education plus new administration and faculty offices and a 210 seat theatre in the Clocktower Building.

September 1989 — The construction and opening of a private sector "Student Housing" complex with 206 units built on campus.

September 1990 — An additional 94 units of housing construction to bring total current capacity to 300 units.

September 1989 — The addition of a full science laboratory facility to the Williams Lake campus to allow for a full first year academic program to be offered there, plus a new LPN/RN Access program for Nurses.

September 1990 — The start of a full three year RN Nursing program in Williams Lake.

September 1991 — The completion of three major facilities expansions or additions:

- a \$4 million expansion to double size of the Library

- a \$6 million expansion to double size of Science Building

- a \$5 million Arts & Education classroom building.

February 1992 — The start of construction on an \$8.7 million Campus Activity Centre, based on self financing rather than government grants.

Summer Sessions

From a modest beginning of a dozen courses offered in 1990, the demand for summer courses has grown to new records each year. Nearly 70 courses, with capacity for over 2,000 registrants, were offered in the 1992 Summer Session. Expectations are that summer session offering will continue to expand.

Facilities Development

Student Centre: Through a College initiative, a \$8.7 million Campus Activity Centre begins construction in October 1991 to provide space and services for the student and staff population. The Centre will open during the Fall 1992 semester.

Athletic Community: As part of the 1993 Canada Summer Games to be hosted by the City of Kamloops, Cariboo will be site of the 'athletes village' and location of two major facilities:

Hillside Stadium: Approximately 2 - 3,000 permanent seats and a full international standard facility for track and field, with an all-weather track surface, field house and two major fields.

Aquatic Centre: Full international standard aquatic centre with 50-meter pool and diving facilities. Both will be multi-use community athletic facilities.

Industry Liaison

Support for local economic development is a major part of the university college mandate, and is expanding in many new directions. Through the presence of the NRC Industrial Technology Advisor on campus, many research and development needs in the region are being matched with faculty expertise, student project-work and the financial support of NRC-IRAP programs.

The need for continued awareness of the practical applications of programs is supported by Program Advisory Committees in place for many programs. Made up of employers, industry experts and others from the community, they serve to ensure training is relevant to current industry practices and are responding to new developments in technology.

International Education

As part of the growing global marketplace and the interests of British Columbia, UCC has made a clear commitment to increase international activity. This includes students from all parts of the world studying at UCC, student exchange and faculty exchange programs, accreditation agreements with schools in other countries, and programs being delivered on a contract basis by UCC faculty, in various locations worldwide.

The highly successful International Education department now has over 200 international students studying at UCC, local students overseas on exchange, accreditation agreements with schools in the Pacific Rim, and is delivering education and training programs directly to students and clients in a number of Pacific Rim countries. All International Education activities are based on full cost-recovery or revenue generation. International student tuition fees

are \$6,100 per year, as these students are paying the full cost of their education. Revenues from the overall International Education program allow UCC to create MORE classroom capacity for local students - contrary to any suggestion that international students take space away.

Looking Ahead

Independent Status

The University College of the Cariboo is evolving towards independent university status, which would be achieved through a change to provincial legislation.

This would allow UCC to begin designing and delivering new degree programs in our own name, and to respond more rapidly to specific needs of the interior region.

New initiatives and proposals for degrees that could be delivered by UCC in coming years include:

- Bachelor of Journalism
- Bachelor of Business Communications
- Bachelor of Health Sciences - Respiratory Therapy
- Bachelor of Health Sciences - Med Lab Technology
- Bachelor of Vocational Education
- Bachelor of Computing Science
- Bachelor of Tourism

While independent status would allow new degrees, it remains the top priority of UCC to continue to grow as a truly unique and comprehensive institution. This means offering the full range of one and two or three year Certificate and Diploma programs, in addition to four or five year degrees, to continue serving the many different needs.
