Course Options

Visual Arts and Theatre courses may be taken individually by students interested only in the development of skills in a specific field. However, they are most often selected as part of a planned program of study leading to one of three Diploma or three Degree choices now available.

Program Options

As a four-year University College, Cariboo now offers students the opportunity to complete full university degrees. As a comprehensive institution, students also can complete Diplomas, and often return later to apply these credits towards a degree.

Students interested in the Visual and Performing Arts now have the choice of three Diplomas and two Degree programs at Cariboo, plus the additional option of transferring credits to another university or accredited art/design school program.

Options at Cariboo include:

- Associate of Arts Diploma (with Fine Arts concentration)
- Fine Arts Diploma
- Digital Art and Design Diploma
- Bachelor of Arts Degree (with Fine Arts or Theatre options)
- Bachelor of Elementary Education Degree (with Fine Arts as a teaching subject)
- Bachelor of Secondary Education Degree *Transfer Program
- Bachelor of Fine Arts Degree * Transfer Program

*Transfer Programs: While both the Secondary Education and Fine Arts Degrees are not yet available at Cariboo, it is anticipated that both may be available within the next couple of years, or sooner. However, students can complete much of their work toward a B.F.A. at Cariboo before having to transfer, and can complete their required first degree (B.A.) here, prior to applying for a secondary education degree program elsewhere.

Associate DIPLOMA of ARTS

Two-year Associate of Arts Diploma with Fine Art as one of the required two areas of concentration.

Associate Diplomas recognize the completion of two years of academic study, of which at least half (30 credits) must have been completed at Cariboo.

The Associate Diploma can be of particular value to students who do not plan to complete a degree program, but need proof of formal post-secondary accomplishment for their resumes and career employment options. It is also of value to students planning to enter the work force for a period of time before continuing study towards a degree.

The Associate of Arts Diploma requires completion of 60 credits of study (usually 20 courses), with at least 24 credits at the 200 level, plus:

- 6 credits of 100 level English
- 12 credits of EACH of two disciplines/concentration

Along with the Fine Arts concentration, student can choose a second concentration in one of these disciplines:

Anthropology, Commerce, Computing, Economics, English, French, Geography, German, History, Mathematics, Philosophy, Political Studies, Psychology, Sociology, Theatre.

Six credits of 100 level study in a language and a science are recommended, but not required. However, students should be aware of these requirements for completion of a B.A. degree.

Note: **Language and **Science are recommended but not required. However, students who wish to eventually continue a degree program are strongly encouraged to take those subjects.

Fine Art Diploma

The Two-year Fine Art Diploma program is designed for students whose main interest is in studio art and not in academic transfer or eventual degree completion. However, the majority of courses are transferable, and students can complete their Fine Arts Diploma as the first step in completing a degree program.

The FINE ART Diploma requires completion of 60 credits of study, of which 48 credits would be in Fine Art, including at least 18 credits at the second year level. An overall grade point average of 2.33 is also required for Diploma status.

A program model would be as follows:

Note that the "course requirements" as listed in the Calendar are all the courses offered, but only twenty courses are generally required to complete the program.

Digital Art and Design Diploma (DADD)

This one year (two semester) Diploma program offers students a unique opportunity to create images, both still and animated, using state-of-the-art electronic equipment.

This is the only program of its kind in British Columbia. The training is intensive, but upon completion will provide successful graduates with a portfolio of work in the form of slides and video tapes that demonstrate the student's creative skills using computer assisted technology.

Admission Requirements

Students applying to the program will be required to provide evidence of at least one years training in fine or commercial art at the college or university level, in the form of a portfolio. Applicants must also have completed B.C. Grade 12 or equivalent.

Applications and portfolios should be submitted as early as possible, and usually before March 31st. All applicants will then be interviewed by the course coordinator prior to admission.

Bachelor of Arts Degree

A four-year Bachelor of Arts degree, with Fine Art as one of the disciplines can now be completed at Cariboo. Graduates will receive their Bachelor of Arts Degree from the University of British Columbia, in association with Cariboo College.

In the third and fourth years of the B.A. program, students complete at least 30 credits from one specific discipline (eg. Creative and Performing Arts), 12 credits from one of three other disciplines (Humanities, Social Sciences, Sciences), plus other electives to total 60 credits of upper level work. Based on this pattern of upper level course selection and choosing Creative and Performing Arts as the discipline, the following two program models are designed to show how students can take all the upper-level Fine Art studio courses and Art History courses within a two year time frame.

Bachelor of Elementary Education Degree

For students who wish to enrol in Bachelor of Education (Elementary) Degree Program and intend to have Fine Art as a teaching subject, a total of 90 credits, or three full years of study are required before students can apply to enter the B.Ed. degree. To have Fine Arts as a teaching subject, specific upper level courses are needed. The required 18 upper level Fine Art Studio courses are:

FINA 387 (Painting/Drawing) - 6 credits

FINA 388 (Printmaking) - 6 credits

FINA 389 (Sculpture) - 6 credits

All three of these upper level courses require FINA 111/121 (Art History) and FINA 112/122 (Design) as prerequisites, so students must take these four courses in the first and/or second year.

While it is recommended that applicants have a Bachelor's Degree before entering the B.Ed. Program, students will be eligible for admission with a minimum of 90 credits of university study. In order to enter the future B. Ed. (Secondary) Degree Program students must first complete a Bachelor's degree.

Course Descriptions

The following are updated descriptions of all courses offered by the Visual and Performing Arts department. All of them come under the titles of FINE ART or THEATRE. Not all courses listed are offered in any given year.

Fine Arts

Fine Art 111-3

History of Art 1 (3,1,0) (0,0,0)

The history of architecture, sculpture, and painting of the Western World, from Ancient Egypt and Mesopotamia to the foundation of a European tradition in the Italian Renaissance of the 15th and 16th centuries.

Transfers to: SFU, UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 112-3

Fundamentals of Design 1 (3,0,1) (0,0,0)

Introduction to the formal elements of design - line, shape, colour, value, texture, space, perspective, composition. A creative design approach will be used. A wide variety of media.

Transfers to: SFU, UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 113-3

Drawing 1 (1,1,2) (0,0,0)

An introduction to the elements of drawing with an emphasis on the seeing/drawing process. The student will use a wide variety of drawing media to learn fundamental techniques

Transferability: SFU, UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 121-3

History of Art (0,0,0) (3,1,0)

A continuation of FINA 111. The relationship between the Italian Baroque of the 16th century and other European movements as they led towards Modern art in this century and art of the present day.

Transferability: SFU, UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 122-3

Fundamentals of Design 2 (0,0,0) (3,0,1)

The study of the design elements started in FINA 112 continues.

Prerequisite: FINA 112 or Instructor's written consent.

Transferability: SFU, UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 123-3

Drawing 2 (0,0,0) (1,1,2)

A continuation of FINA 1113. During this course students will study the relationships of form, line tone, texture, space and composition, while using a variety of media and techniques.

Prerequisite: FINA 113 or Instructor's written consent.

Transferability: SFU, UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 172-3

Introductory Ceramics 1 (1,1,2) (0,0,0)

Basic wheel and bench techniques. Bisque and glaze firing.

Transferability: UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 174-3

Printmaking 1 (1,1,2) (0,0,0)

Introduction to general screenprinting techniques, handcut film, reduction screen, hand drawn positive, as well as lino cut and monotype prints. Students will be allocated additional studio time for completion of assignments.

Transferability: UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 175-3

Painting 1 (1,1,2) (0,0,0)

The fall semester centers on gaining a fundamental knowledge of the materials and techniques of painting. An emphasis will be placed on the formal aspects of painting: composition, colour, tonal relationships, spatial relationships.

Transferability: SFU, UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 176-3

Introduction To Photography 1 (1,1,2) (0,0,0)

An introduction to the techniques of photography. A practical course giving a grounding in camera and darkroom techniques for black and white photography. There will be some emphasis on visual use of both studio and natural light.

Transferability: UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 182-3

Introductory Ceramics 2 (0,0,0) (1,1,2)

Investigation of more sophisticated use of glaze techniques, development of production skills, Also an introduction to glaze formulation.

Prerequisite: FINA 172 or written permission of instructor

Transferability: SFU, UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 184-3

Printmaking 2 (0,0,0) (1,1,2)

Further practice in screen printing emphasizing photoscreen, darkroom procedures, drypoint and collograph techniques.

Prerequisite: FINA 174 or written permission of Instructor.

Transferability: UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 185-3

Painting 2 (0,0,) (1,1,2)

This winter semester will be a continuation of FINA 175, 2i5h a development of personal subject matter.

Prerequisite: FINA 175 or written permission of Instructor

Transferability: SFU, UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 186-3

Introduction To Photography 2 (0,0,0) (1,1,2) (L)

A continuation of FINA 176. Students will be encouraged to develop individual styles and interests and will explore the black and white image as a creative art form. Students must own their own 35 mm camera.

Prerequisite: FINA 176 or instructor's permission.

Transferability: UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 211-3

History of Art 3 (3,0,0) (0,0,0)

The 18th and 19th Centuries.

Prerequisite: FINA 111/121 or equivalent

Transferability: SFU, UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 212-3

Painting 3 (1,0,2) (0,0,0)

Emphasis on development of individual skills and creativity. Wide variety of media.

Prerequisite: FINA 175/185

Transferability: SFU, UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 213-3

Drawing 3 (1,0,3) (0,0,0)

The seeing/drawing process enlarged with an emphasis on investigative work and the continued development of a personal creative growth which at all times will maintain the freedom of individual approach.

Prerequisite: FINA 113/123 or Instructor's written consent.

Transferability: SFU, UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 221-3

History of Art 4 (0,0,0) (3,0,0)

The 20th Century

Prerequisite: FINA 111/121/211 Transferability: SFU, UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 222-3

Painting 4 (0,0,0) (1,1,2)

Students develop own program in the main, working towards a Graduation Evaluation Exhibit.

Prerequisite: FINA 212

Transferability: SFU, UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 223-3

Drawing 4 (0,0,0) (1,1,2)

A continuation of the areas of investigation initiated in FINA 213. There will be grater emphasis on the development of personal approach to subject matter and how it may be expressed through drawing.

Prerequisite: FINA 213

Transferability: SFU, UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 271-3

Sculpture (1,1,2) (0,0,0)

The use of various materials to explore ideas of sculptural volume mass, and shape.

Prerequisite: FINA 112/122

Transferability: SFU

Fine Art 272-3

Ceramics 3(1,1,2)(0,0,0)

Students will work towards perfecting traditional skills with the object of using them to invent personal and original solutions to three-dimensional expression.

Prerequisite: FINA 172/182 or equivalent

Transferability: UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 274-4

Printmaking 3 (1,1,2) (0,0,0)

Individual development and expression in print technique, e.g. lithography.

Prerequisite: FINA 174/184 or equivalent

Transferability: UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 276-4

Photography (1,1,2) (0,0,0) (L)

This course will be an extension of the concerns of FINA 185/186. There will be a dual emphasis on technical refinements to basic photographic processes and on photography as an experimental practice. These two approaches will be considered in relation to contemporary theoretical concerns.

Prerequisite: FINA 186 or Instructor's permission.

Transferability: UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 281-3

Sculpture (0,0,0) (1,1,2)

A continuation of sculpture 271 with an emphasis on assemblage and constructive techniques.

Prerequisite: FINA 112/122

Transferability: SFU

Fine Art 282-3

Ceramics 4 (0,0,0) (1,1,2)

Individual development and expression working towards an Evaluation Exhibit.

Prerequisite: FINA 272

Transferability: UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 284-3

Printmaking 4 (0,0,0) (1,1,2)

Individual development in the etching medium.

Prerequisite: FINA 274
Transferability: UBC, UVIC

Fine Art 286-3

Photography (0,0,0) (1,1,2)

Students will be expected to develop a body of work with personally relevant subject matter. This body of work should utilize the technique considered in FINA 276 and address the theoretical concerns of that class.

Transferability: UVIC, UBC

Fine Art 335-6

Art of the Italian Renaissance from Biotto to Michelangelo (2-1; 2-1)

A survey of the principle works of art from the rise of the city-states (ca. 1250) to the phenomenon of Mannerism in the 16th century; topics include the new conception of the artist and the changing role of the patron as well as the transformation of traditional artistic genres.

Fine Art 337-6

Art of Western Europe 1600 - 1800 (2-1;2-1)

European power; the absolutism of Louis XIV and Versailles; the bourgeoisie in Holland and Restoration England; and the urbanity and rationalism of 18th-century France, England, and Venice.

Please note: FINA 339-6 The Emergence of Modern Art - UBC recognizes Cariboo College 211/221 as equivalent to FINA 339. For details of program and course descriptions and transferability please refer to Fine Art in the Career/Technology section of this calendar.

Fine Arr 340-6

Directions in Twentieth Century Art (2,1,0) (2,1,0)

A survey of the Arts of Europe and the United States since the turn of the century; an examination of major artistic movements, the achievements of seminal artists, and the modernist phenomenon will provide keys for the understanding of today's art.

Fine Art 387-6

Studio Media: Painting and Drawing (0,0,3) (0,0,3)

Explorations of basic drawing and painting concerns.

Prerequisite: FINA 112-122 and FINA 111-121

Fine Art 338-6

Studio Media: Printmaking (0,0,3) (0,0,3)

Introduction to intaglio, etching and relief printmaking with emphasis on metal plate etching. Color etching and other methods may also be considered.

Prerequisite: FINA 112-122 and FINA 111-121

Fine Art 389-6

Studio Media: Sculpture (0,0,3 (0,0,3)

Basic sculpture, including both plastic and structural approaches to form; assemblage technique; particular attention to articulation of space.

Prerequisite: FINA 112/122 & FINA 111/121

Fine Art 486-6

Tutorial in Studio Art (0,0,3) (0,0,3)

Prerequisite: FINA 387, 388, 389.

> Theatre

Theatre forms part of the Visual and Performing Arts Department

Theatre 110-3

Introduction to Theatre (3,0,0) (0,0,0)

A lecture and discussion oriented course designed to acquaint students with the various aspects of the theatrical process from both the practical and historical perspective.

Transferability: SFU, UBC, UVIC

Theatre 111-3

Introduction to Acting (3,0,0) (0,0,0)

A performance oriented course designed to help students develop the basic requirements necessary for a dramatic presentation. The course focuses on stage movement, vocal training, mime, character development and portrayal.

Transferability: SFU, UBC, UVIC

Theatre 112-3

Introduction to Technical Theatre (1,0,4) (0,0,0)

A hands-on practical course designed to introduce students to the elementary principles of scenery and properties construction; stagecraft, lighting, electrical and audio operations, and costume construction

Transferability: SFU, UBC, UVIC

Theatre 120-3

Introduction to Theatre 2 (0,0,0) (3,0,0)

A continuation of THTR 110.

Transferability: SFU, UBC, UVIC. ULeth

Theatre 121-3

Introduction to Acting 2 (0,0,0) (3,0,0)

A continuation of the work begun in Theatre 111. This course focuses on the analysis and development of character portrayal. Working with a script and a study of the actor's role in the performance situation will be emphasized. A studio/workshop production is planned for the end of the term.

Prerequisite: THTR 111 or instructor's written consent.

Transferability: SFU, UBC, UVIC, ULeth

Theatre 122-3

Introduction to Technical Theatre 2 (0,0,0) (1,0,4)

A continuation of Theatre 112

Prerequisite: THTR 112 or Instructor's written consent.

Transferability: SFU, UBC

Speech 150-3

Speech Communication (3,0,0)

A performance oriented course designed to present students with a study of the oral communication process, and the presentation skills required in the preparation of effective oral communications.

Transferability: UVIC
