

IN THE BEGINNING Established in 1970, Cariboo

College was created by a merger

between the Society seeking to establish the college, and the Kamloops Vocational school then under construction on this site. The first year of classes were held at the Kamloops Indian Residential School, while the "Main" building was completed to house the trades and academic programs that would together make up the new College.

The College officially opened the present campus in 1971, where the Main Building and Cafeteria were surrounded by sand and sagebrush. The library was added in 1975, and at the end of the first decade both the Science building and Gymnasium were built. The addition of a classroom block to the second floor of the Main building, and the Clocktower Building and Theatre were completed in 1989. The Library and Science buildings were doubled in size and the new Arts & Education Building opened in 1991, and the Campus Activity Centre and Canada Games Aquatic Centre both began construction in early 1992.

LOOKING AHEAD

University-college status was granted in March 1989, and the

opportunity to complete full university degrees in Kamloops has created a new alternative for many students in the interior. The response has been substantial enrollment increases every year.

Cariboo has seen tremendous change as the result of degree programs and there's more to come. In 1991 Cariboo adopted the new name of "The University College of the Cariboo" to better reflect the comprehensive nature of this new postsecondary institution. The change will be legally formalized when the legislation governing Colleges and Institutes in B.C. is changed within the next year or two to give UCC independent degree-granting status.

COMPREHENSIVE The University College of the Cariboo

is one of four designated University-

Colleges in B.C. As it evolves towards independent university status, UCC is committed to expanding its unique identity as a truly comprehensive post-secondary institution.

UCC now offers seven full university degree programs with the three provincial universities: Bachelor of Arts (UBC); Bachelor of Science (UBC); Bachelor of Elementary Education (UBC); Bachelor of Business Studies (SFU); Bachelor of Social Work (UVic); Bachelor of Science in Nursing (UVic) and the new Bachelor of Natural Resource Science Degree, designed and developed at UCC and launched in September 1992.

Along with degrees, UCC awards two-year Associate Degrees, plus Diplomas and Certificates in a wide range of specialized career programs, applied industrial technology, vocational and developmental programs. As well, a full extension services operation provides non-credit and extension credit courses across the region, and develops many specialized contract training programs for communities and clients that range from First Nations tribal councils to public and private sector employers.

ECONOMIC PARTNER UCC is committed to support-

ing economic development in

Kamloops and across the region. From the private sector McGill Student Housing development, the Cariboo Management Centre, and the Computer Access Centre in downtown Kamloops to co-operative education, technology transfer research projects, and the delivery of extension and contract training programs across the region, UCC people are working in support of the regional economy.

With over 600 employees and an annual operating budget of nearly \$60 million, the direct economic impact is significant. On campus, classrooms and athletic facilities are used by local community groups, the library is open to all residents, and the Dining Room, operated by the food training program, has a reputation of being second to none.

REGIONAL MANDATE UCC is a regional institution, serving 60,000 square miles

in B.C.'s interior. Beyond the main campus in Kamloops, facilities include a second campus in Williams Lake, Learning Centres in Merritt and 100 Mile House, and a network of community coordinators across the region.

THE CAMPUS

The 250-acre main campus is located on the south slope of Kamloops, overlooking the

meeting of the North and South Thompson rivers. While less than 100 acres is currently developed, a long-range campus plan will ensure future growth that is both functional and in keeping with the natural beauty of the area.

Over 50 years ago, the campus was home to the Canadian Navy during WW2, as the site of the navy's ammunition and torpedo storage dumps. The small green and white "houses" along the western edge of the campus, still in use today, were officer's quarters on the base during this time.

As the campus grows there will be more "people oriented" plazas of green grass and flowers to compliment the beautiful landscaping, much of it designed and developed by the horticulture program at UCC.

PARKING

Pay parking regulations are in effect from 8 am to 5 pm in all student lots with a daily charge of \$0.75. There is no charge for parking in student lots in the evening, on weekends or statutory holidays. Staff parking lots are reserved for vehicles with staff stickers only. 
