**Merritt Centre Grand Opening** 


On Wednesday, February 8th, forty-six people gathered outside the new Merritt Centre for the ribboncutting and festivities associated with the opening of UCC's newest centre.

Jim Wright officiated at the opening, which saw Merritt's dignitaries out in full force. Jim commented on the coincidence of UCC's autonomy coming at the same time as the Merritt Centre official opening, and stated that the Merritt Centre reflects the UCC Board of Governors' regional focus and presence.

Board chair Paula McRae remarked upon the "good neighbour" policy of UCC, and stressed that UCC appreciated partnerships with Nicola-region businesses, as well as with other educational institutions.

Merritt mayor Clara Norgaard stressed that the Centre was "much needed," a sentiment echoed by MLA Harry Lali and UCC board member from Merritt Bob Baird, who also offered their congratulations to the staff, faculty and students at the Merritt facility.

Adrian Kershaw echoed everyone's delight, and thanked the advisory committee for advice, support and planning for the Centre, which was 5 years in the making. He reserved special thanks for school district representative Mike Henderson, and for Merritt Community Coordinator Janice Riley, who was pleased to report that student enrolments doubled when the Merritt Centre was built.

The Centre is located right downtown at 1600 Voght Street. A brand-new facility with large, bright classrooms, the Centre features wide hallways, wheelchair access, and a student lounge in the main building. Clean white wall, teal carpets and dark rose countertops give an uplifting appearance, especially when brightened by the generous light from the two huge skylights in the main hall.

Two seminar rooms and a 30-seat classroom at the Centre offer the local community an excellent educational environment as well as a community meeting place. Coordinator Janice Riley is a capable and cheerful young woman with loads of experience and a winning attitude. No wonder enrolments had already doubled by the time Harry Lali, Paula McRae and Bob Baird cut the ribbon!

### Just Do W.I.T.T.!

On Tuesday, March 7 UCC hosts the **Women in Trades and Technology Conference**, from 9am to 3pm in C-Block. This conference is for young women, presently in high school, who would like to find out more about trades and technology careers.

A number of tradeswomen, including some instructors, will assist Grade 9 to 12 students as they take the opportunity to work in a variety of trade and technical areas.

This educational event is co-sponsored by School District 24, UCC, the Board of School Trustees, and the Central Interior Science, Technology and Innovation Council.

#### Where is the Cariboo?

At noon on Thursday, March 9, UCC Geography instructor Ken Favrholdt will present his research on regional consciousness in British Columbia as a subject of historical and regional geography in the second of the UCC/UBC Lecture Series.

The evolution of regionalism in B.C. finds expression from the earliest days of the province to the present. Favrholdt focuses his presentation on regionalism in the interior of the province, specifically the Cariboo, as he looks at the historical evolution of the Cariboo, the politicization of the region, and the results of land-use planning processes, including views from the "outside."

Favrholdt argues that the implications of the recent CORE process go beyond economic and environmental aspects, as well as beyond the Cariboo, and actually represent a form of bioregionalism at work in B.C.

When First Nations land claims and the concept of aboriginal territories are added to the regional mix, the concept of bioregionalism takes on a potent utility. Favrholdt sees this as a hopefully positive phenomenon in B.C., as local communities take increasing charge of their immediate resources, First Nations groups negotiate their claims to the land, and government programs respond to regional needs and initiatives.
