Colleague coming

"Colleague," an integrated management information system, replaces out-dated record-keeping in Human Resources, Student Services and Finance. The first two departments are now online, but it's taking longer than expected to get finance up and running.

As a result, budgetary printouts have been delayed. But don't panic. UCC Director of Finance Ernie Millard says things will be back on track towards the end of October, and orientations will go ahead in November.

Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act

Passed in 1992, and due to come into effect for universities and colleges in October/94, the new B.C. FOI allows any citizen the right to ask for, and receive, information about an institution and its employees.

Salary levels, travel expenses, qualifications, operations records, blueprints, and almost anything else are subject to public scrutiny. Colleges and universities in B.C. will be busy over the next few months, collecting and collating information from employees and departments.

But, to prevent everyone's neighbour from becoming a potential Big Brother, the provincial government has provided for some privacy protection. Inquiring parties may have to fill out an official form, delaying the process somewhat, and information, including reference letters, disclosure due to be published within 60 days, information harmful to personal privacy or safety, personal correspondence from another party, and some other documents, will be protected.

Here at UCC, on-campus FOI coordinator Linda Walch is preparing FOI forms now, but stresses that UCC policy is to release most information without having to invoke the Act. Policy and procedures are in the development stage, and extraordinary issues will be dealt with on an individual basis as they arise.

· Congratulations to electronics instructor Henry Reiser, awarded a Technology Development Fellowship by the BC Advanced Systems Institute (ASI). ASI arranges linkages between researchers, developers and users of advanced systems technologies, so that these technologies may be developed, commercialized and used to aid in the growth of BC's economy. This Fellowship will allow Henry to work on

technology transfer projects designed to adapt university-developed technologies to industry requirements. UCC's focus on robotics, computer automation and process control technologies should ultimately help the Interior forest products industry.

 UCC English Instructor George Johnson has won the 1994 Twentieth-Century Literature/Andrew J. Kappel Prize as the outstanding submission to Twentieth-Century Literature (TCL) in the past year.

George's essay, "The Spirit of the Age: Virginia Woolf's Response to Second Wave Psychology" judged the best by English novelist, John Fowles, is featured in the summer '94 issue of TCL.

The AECBC, a voluntary, non-profit association of B.C. post-secondary colleges, institutes and agencies, provides advocacy, leadership and support for its members, as well as influencing government post-secondary education policies and informing the public about issues related to advanced education.

Skills Now funding for UCC

Over eighty thousand dollars is coming our way for a course in Small Business Skills for Second-Language Entrepreneurs.

The course, designed to help Canadian citizens and landed immigrants gain English language instruction along with technical/ vocational training, is part of the Combined Skills Training Program, a BC government initiative under the Skills Now plan.

Other institutions receiving Skills Now funding include Okanagan University College, Vancouver Community College, Capilano College, Kwantlen College, BCIT, and Camosun College, in such areas as Food Preparation, Early Childhood Education and General Office Assistant. UCC offers the only course in Small Business Skills.

Two of Canadian playwright George Ryga's works are the first of many eclectic films to be shown by the organizers of "Unreel Videos," a group of movie buffs who meet Thursday nights at 7 PM to watch movies and stuff popcorn in VA 106.

Apart from a one-time, one-dollar membership fee, screenings are free, and discussion follows in a friendly, informal atmosphere. UCC theatre instructor Jim Hoffman, official Ryga biographer, hosts the September 22nd presentation of two 30 minute film adaptations: Indian, in which an oppressed native man rebels, and For Want of Something Better To Do, a Russian story by Maxim Gorky, given a Canadian Prairies setting.

But, as with the former Society, film selections are still both excellent and eclectic. Offered this fall are Sirens, Thirty-Two Short Films About Glenn Gould, The Snapper, and La Belle Epoque.

The first, Sirens, shown at the NorthHills Theatre on Thursday, September 15th at 9:00 PM., weaves a sensuous thread through the topics of repression and artistic freedom in 1930s Australia. The second, Thirty-Two Short Films About Glenn Gould, described as "an innovative and unusual portrait," plays October 6th at 9:00 PM.

Admission is \$5.00 at the door, in addition to an annual membership fee of \$1.00.

Confederation Life dies

UCC's Group Life, Health and Dental Insurance carrier went into receivership August 11/94, after attempts at resuscitation failed to revive the doomed company. But the collapse won't hurt UCC employees, states UCC Human Resources Director Jim Michals, in an August 16/94 memo urging employees to continue to forward all claims to Confederation Life until further notification.

Research Proposal workshop


