



COURSE SELECTIONS

EDUCATIONAL COSTS

Tuition fees at Cariboo College are less than those at provincial universities. A generally lower cost of living in the Interior means further savings in the overall cost of post-secondary education.

Estimated annual expenses at Cariboo College for 1991/1992:

- Tuition: lower level study \$30.50 per credit to a \$457.50 maximum per semester

- Tuition: upper level study \$47.00 per credit to a \$705.00 maximum per semester
- Student fees \$36.00
- Books and supplies \$50.00 to \$75.00 per course
- Other fees approximately \$60.00
- On-campus housing \$285.00 per month (1990/91 rate)

REGISTRATION

Registration will take place between June 3 and July 31, based on year level and date of COMPLETED application. In order to register, students will be required to pay a maximum \$200.00 non-refundable "commitment fee" which will apply towards the first semester's tuition fees.

ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIPS

Cariboo College makes available, through the College Foundation, a limited number of entrance scholarships for students entering this degree program. Further information is available through the Financial Aid and Awards Office.

APPLICATION FOR ADMISSION

Application is made to the Admissions Office at Cariboo College.

The documents required include official transcripts of previous secondary and post-secondary educational records and proof of citizenship or Landed Immigrant status if not born in Canada, or valid student permit.

The deadline for application is April 15th. It is recommended that the application and related documentation be submitted as soon as possible. If applicants have not yet completed all course requirements, the minimum documentation must include:

- Completed Application for Admission form

- \$15.00 Application Processing Fee (only for students who have never attended Cariboo College before)
- Copy of official interim or final grades

ADVISOR OR COUNSELLOR

Students entering first year academic studies should make an appointment with the Counselling Department to ensure that they understand and select the proper lower level courses to meet the Bachelor of Arts degree requirements. Call 828-5023 for appointments.

All other students, whether entering second year or now applying for admission to the Arts degree program, should arrange to meet with the Program Advisor as soon as possible.

BACHELOR OF ARTS – UBC

Cariboo College offers a Bachelor of Arts degree conferred by the University of British Columbia (UBC), providing students with a broad, yet rigorous exposure to the liberal arts.

Following the requirements of the B.A. degree program at UBC, the four-year program offered at Cariboo College qualifies students for a General,



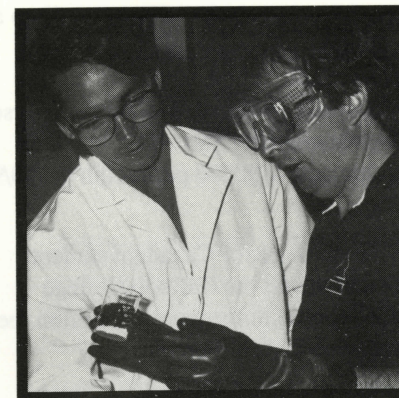
as distinct from a Major or Specialist, degree in Arts.

Students will choose a field of concentrated study in their upper level courses. Many graduates of this degree program may also choose to take advantage of further post-graduate degree opportunities, including Bachelor of Education degrees from UBC, also offered at Cariboo College.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Admission to the degree program requires a separate application sent to the Admissions Department at Cariboo College before or on April 15th, the completion of two years of post-secondary education, and is based on meeting the following requirements:

- Successful completion of a minimum of 48-60 College credits of lower division work, normally including all courses needed to meet the Language, English, Science and Literature requirements
- Minimum grade point average (GPA) of 2.0 on all previous university-level credit courses attempted, including failures and repeated courses
- UBC English 100 (any two of Cariboo College English 110, 111 and 121) or equivalent
- Language Requirement: NO further work required if completed Grade 12 French or foreign language to Grade 12 level, BUT:
 - a) IF ONLY Grade 11 French or foreign language: 6 credits in same language or 12 credits in another language, during first two years
 - b) IF LESS than Grade 11 French or foreign language: Successful completion of 12 credits in French or another foreign language, during first two years
- Science Requirement: During first two years, 6 credits of work in ONE OF: Science (including Computing), Math, OR Geography 112 and 122
- Literature Requirement: In addition to UBC English 100 or equivalent, 6 credits of English Literature, usually at the 200-level
- Successful completion of the UBC English Composition Test (ECT) at set times arranged by Cariboo College. NOTE: The ECT may be written



during the third year, but must be successfully completed by the time students have completed 90 credits. They will not be allowed to re-register in the program after this until the ECT has been completed successfully.

- Canadian citizenship, Landed Immigrant status, or a valid student permit issued by Canada (indicating Cariboo College as a place of study).

TRANSFER STUDENTS

Students who have attended or completed their first two years at another public college or provincial university are accepted on the same basis as students attending Cariboo College, in accordance with the 'Transfer Policy' outlined in the UBC Calendar.

DEADLINE FOR APPLICATION

Application deadline is April 15th at the Admissions Office at Cariboo College. Late applications will be considered only if there is space still available.

Admission to third and fourth year will be selective. Students having the highest overall grade point average will be given preference.

ONCE ADMITTED: Course Selection and Registration

Students accepted into the Arts degree program will select their proposed courses as early as possible, in consultation with the Arts Advisor. A

Course Planning Form must then be returned to the Admissions Office. Third and fourth year students must have their proposed course programs approved each year before registration.

In the last 60 credits of course work in third and fourth years, at least 48 credits must be in courses numbered 300 and above.

AREAS OF CONCENTRATION

Courses available to Arts students are grouped into four broad categories:

- Humanities (English, French, History, Philosophy)
- Social Sciences (Anthropology, Economics, Geography, Political Studies, Psychology, Sociology)
- Creative and Performing Arts (Fine Arts, Music, Theatre)
- Sciences (Biology, Chemistry, Computing, Math, Physics)

Students select their area of concentration and plan their course selections based on:

- At least 30 credits at 300- and 400-levels from ONE of the four categories, with 18 credits in one discipline in that category
- At least 12 credits at 300- and 400-levels from one other category
- Electives to complete the 60 credits of 300- and 400-level course work, toward the total of 120 credits required to complete the degree. In the last two years of study no more than two courses may be at the 100- or 200-level.
