Ossinger is qualified to assume the captain's position in any fishing vessel of less than 100 gross tons operating up to 120 miles offshore. Her career plans include serving with the Coast Guard and the coastal ferry fleet.

"The course is beneficial not only for those plan to put to sea, but also for individuals seeking land-based jobs such as radio-telephone operators and dispatchers."






Camosun College

"The relatively small classes and the personal nature of the instruction in the community colleges really helped me as a student."




▲ Alan Maudie College of the Rockies






Vancouver Community College

"My studies at Vancouver Community College regarding the marine industry have come in especially handy, as most of our fruit for export is containerized and transported by water."






▲ Bob McDonald Open Learning Agency




University College of the Fraser Valley

"Langara's Photography Program was great — grads come out of the program with a great foundation of skills, both creatively and technically."




▲ Judson Beaumont Emily Carr Institute of Art & Design

Reid encouraged him to enroll in VSA, where he became one of only two Native students.

After VSA, Davidson apprenticed under Reid. He then went on to reclaim the "classical" tradition of Haida art, and to enrich it with a new vocabulary of materials and techniques. He considers himself lucky for the guidance of his "spirit helpers" as well as his earthly mentors.

"I received a lot of support from the instructors and students. They understood the demands of being a parent and student — The college program helped us recognize what we could do."


▼ Sue Skeates
