On-Line With Earle Birney

At Career Fair Monday, April 22, UCC's Earle Birney website officially opened.

The site, featuring a complete collection of the works and life of one of Canada's finest writers, two-time Governor-General's award-winner Earle Birney, joins the McGill University website *Building Canada* as the newest available SchoolNet Digital Collections demonstration project funded under contract by Industry Canada.

This program's commitment to training young people in the use of new technologies is underlined by the fact that not only is the site designed to be used by students across Canada and beyond as a teaching tool, the construction of the site itself involved both university college and high school students, teaching them valuable technical and web skills.

Project leader Will Garrett-Petts and Webmaster Dan O'Reilly, along with Kamloops Secondary School teacher and high school liaison Paul Porter, together with ten students (five men and five women), created a digital archive.

"All of the potential of World Wide Web technology as a facilitator for teaching future students means nothing without the cooperation and goodwill of people like Wailan Low, the university archives, Industry

Canada, the National Library of Canada, the local school district and our own students and computer services personnel at UCC," states Garrett-Petts.

A number of seminars to train local teachers in the use of the site have been set up at the Henry Grube Centre in Kamloops, coordinated by a local teacher, UCC B.Ed. graduate Dale Calhoud.

1996 Jeans Day

Jeans Day is a project developed as a fundraiser for the BC Children's Hospital. Summer Sports Camps

Mini-camps for children aged 5 to 12 years will be held Monday to Friday through July and possibly August. Participants may attend either the morning session (9 am to noon) or the afternoon session (1 pm to 4:30 pm). Morning camps will feature such activities as basketball, volleyball, soccer, martial arts, wrestling, baseball, mountain biking and track & field. Afternoon camps will feature outdoor activities and water fun, and academics the "fun" way (miniuniversity). Student/instructor ratio is 7 to 1, and the cost per camp is \$65.

Main camps are developed for children aged 13 to 18, and are instructed by UCC coaches and high-level athletes. They run Monday to Friday from 9 am to 4:30 pm, with a student/instructor ratio of 10:1. The main camps focus on either basketball or volleyball, and the cost is \$120 per week.


Women's March Against Poverty
