


The Real Spirit of Giving

International Tuition Raised

At the November 16, 1996 meeting of the UCC Board of Governors, Schedule A of the Bylaws, increasing academic lower level and vocational fees for Foreign Students, was approved, and has been forwarded to the Minister of Education for approval. The fees will be \$223.63 per student.

Canadian Studies Kicks Off

The inauguration of UCC's Canadian Studies program takes place in the Grand Hall on Friday, January 17th. The program, developed due to student demand and already enjoying a much higher level of registrations than anticipated, is a path within the general BA program which offers students a unique opportunity to custom design a cluster of courses with Canadian content.

Caution Closes Campus

A decision to close most of the old 'original' building at the Williams Lake campus was made Tuesday, November 26 after a 2kg chunk of concrete that fell from the ceiling over the weekend indicated that the original part of the building had shifted. An engineer was called Monday morning to inspect the damage, and the decision was made to cancel classes until the building's structural integrity could be restored.

"Our primary concern at all times is safety," says Jim Wright, "and that's why the decision was made to close the area." A temporary steel and concrete

brace will solve the problem in the short term. while engineers determine the actual cause of the problem and recommend a permanent solution. The temporary repair work is expected to be complete by the second week of December, allowing UCC to reopen those areas of the building that have been closed, including the library, computer labs, welding shop, ITV classroom, offices and other classroom areas.



Paper Partners


A scientific paper recently published in the *Canadian Journal* of *Botany Vol.74*, 1996, pp1616-1620, was coauthored by UCC Biology instructor **Ron Smith** with **Dave**

Caswell, Aura Carriere and Barbara Zielke, three of his Directed Studies students. A study of the heritability of ginsenosides, the natural "medicine" in ginseng, the paper, entitled "Variation in the ginsenoside content of American ginseng, Panax quinquefolius L., roots," was based on various studies carried out by Ron and by the three students in the final year of their undergraduate studies.

The paper has attracted interest in the ginseng industry and in the scientific community, and may be the first paper co-authored by UCC faculty and students to be published in an internationally recognized journal. All students have since graduated. Barbara Zeilke now works as a medical laboratory technician at RIH, Dave Caswell conducts field research for the BC Ministry of Environment, and Aura Carriere is a part time lab instructor in chemistry at UCC.

Bonafide Buyer

Barb Chmilar has received her CPP (Certified Professional Purchaser) designation from the Purchasing Management Association of Canada, the national licensing body for professional purchasers. Barb achieved her designation after 10 years of taking correspondence courses, and attending seminars, UCC classes, and a live-in course at the University of Calgary. The program required completion of four levels, and culminated in a final written examination at SFU. Says Barb, "I started when the program was initiated, because it was a great opportunity to get in on the ground floor – it opens up new vistas – who knows where it will take me."

Journals On-Line

A website based at SFU provides easy, unprecedented access to Canada's academic journals. The Canadian Association of Learned Journals' (CALJ) site managed by the Canadian Centre for Studies in Publishing at SFU, allows access to over 40 journals, and it's still building. The purpose of the proiect, which received startup financing by Industry Canada's SchoolNet, is to provide world-wide electronic access, at a minimum, to the tables of contents of all Canadian scholarly journals. For a nominal fee, all journals may have a home page created for them and placed on the site. Hopefully we'll soon see Textual Studies in Canada, UCC's own scholarly journal, displayed on the web. Library Trial

The UCC Library now offers access to ABI/Inform-PowerPages on a one-year trial basis to all UCC students and staff. This service provides abstracting and indexing to articles from more than 1000 business and management journals, as well as the full text of articles from half of the indexed titles. With this service, a user searches the ABI/Inform database (available through LIB-CAT--the UCC Library catalogue) and then can electronically request articles that are flagged as "Article Available." The request is electronically conveyed to the PowerPages system at SFU Library, which retrieves the article and faxes it to the UCC Library. The whole process takes 5 - 15 minutes. These articles can then be picked up at the **UCC** Library circulation desk. Students are charged \$1 for each article received. For more detailed information. please consult staff at the Library Information Desk. A handout on this service is also available at the Library.






