

# Nature Unkind to UCC in Williams Lake

After years of working to establish a single, unified presence in Williams Lake, UCC has been literally "sent back to the beginning" by the powerful forces of Mother Nature.

The Williams Lake campus, which saw a \$1.5 million expansion just a few years ago, is being forced to close because of massive underground movements that fractured the building last December and have continued to strain the structure.

Following a Board decision in June to close the building, the efforts to relocate programs and offices have consumed the summer for many UCC staff, and will leave the "campus" spread around town in as many as 12 different locations.

Program clusters are being housed together, so it won't quite be necessary for students to drive across town to get to their next class, but the logistics are still staggering.


The government has allocated \$600,000 to be used to lease up to 2,295 square metres of temporary space, but UCC had about 3,800 square metres of space, so some courses may not be offered. As it is, ITV classes will be in the BC Tel building, Early Childhood Education will use the Glendale School Daycare Room, Sciences will be at Columneetza Secondary, and a Forest Technician contract has relocated to a commercial building downtown.

BCBC is still negotiating leases for Mechanics programs and the Library, and Facilities is arranging space for ESL in a local school. Academic and College Prep programs start two weeks later than usual, on Monday, September 15, in a downtown commercial building in Barnard Square, with administration taking up a floor of the same building.

Parking is still an outstanding issue, partly because there isn't a lot of space downtown, but UCC is looking at a government-owned piece of property about three blocks from the Barnard Square site. It's still not known at this point when, if ever, UCC can move back to the Hodgson Road campus.

Despite the obvious logistical nightmare of relocating an entire regional university college structure between semesters, Williams Lake staff are in good control of the situation. Administrative staff member Grace Simpson calls it "organization in the middle of disorganization. We just have to be positive, and make the best of it," she laughs. Keeping student solidarity going is likely to be a challenge, she notes, but UCC Williams Lake is planning a welcoming BBQ for the end of September, and faculty from the various program areas will meet on a regular basis.

And there are some perks to the move, Grace says. "We have a real presence in downtown Williams Lake now. Everywhere you look, there are UCC signs, and we're working hard to make sure that all of our students have a good experience this year."

# Partnership Agreement

UCC and the North Thompson Community Skills Centre in Clearwater have just signed a partnership agreement that will see UCC offering credit courses only, and the Skills Centre offering all other training in the North Thompson region. UCC will also provide training under contract to the Skills Centre.

Sylvia Arduini, UCC's Clearwater Community Coordinator, will now have a reduced UCC work load, but, in her new position as educational coordinator to the Skills

Centre, will continue to work closely with her colleagues at UCC.

This unique agreement is designed to prevent the kind of competitive relationship that has developed between skills centres and colleges elsewhere in the province, but will allow UCC to retain a significant profile in the community.



# TSC Meets U of A

No, it's not a battle of the acronyms. TSC, aka *Textual Studies in Canada*, edited by UCC English instructors Henry Hubert and Will Garrett-Petts and others, will be co-published for the first time by UCC and the University of Alberta Press as a U of A book title.

The collaboration was initiated by faculty at the U of A, who approached the TSC editorial board with a request to publish the proceedings of an important conference on regionalism. TSC's board didn't want to devote a whole issue to conference proceedings, but recognized the value of the discussion on regionalism, so, with some adjustments, the issue was devoted to essays on regionalism in literature by an important cluster of authors. At about that time, the University of Alberta Press caught wind of the project, recognized its textbook potential, and negotiated a co-publishing deal with TSC. TSC #9 will therefore be a special issue titled A Sense of Place--Regionalism in Canadian and American Literature.

# **Booking It**

Since the Chapter 2000 library campaign began, the UCC Library has purchased or received as gifts over 7000 volumes, as well as hundreds of rolls of microfilm, new CD Rom and laser disk workstations, a new microfilm reader-printer, and a video projection machine for the library classroom.

# **Foundation Friends**

"We are extremely pleased to join the UCC Foundation in this effort to ensure a strong future for our students and our community," says Kamloops Tech Shop Operations Director Peter Cameron-Inglis. Edge Computer General Manager, Paul Ridoutt, adds that "we are very happy to be associated with the Kamloops Tech Shop and this effort. This generous offer to support the University College and the Kamloops community is extremely admirable." "These are difficult times for students," says Richard Scott, Commcorp CIBC Marketing Representative. "This fundraising program launched today is exactly what is needed in today's expensive learning environment, and we feel proud to join Kamloops Tech Shop in this effort."
