Breathing a sigh of relief that they weren't present in the Empire State Building the week of the shootings, UCC Model UN delegates Jennifer Erickson, Jeremy Baillie, Lesley Johnson, Edward Noakes, Charlene Eden, Corry Muir, Lisa Krutop, Laurren Rogers, Christie Atherton and Regan Mackenzie have settled back into campus life. Their foray into the world of international diplomacy at the North American Model United Nations in Toronto was a success for all involved--even faculty sponsor Derek Cook benefitted from faculty contacts made at the event.

The purpose of the conference was to promote student awareness and interest in international issues, to provide a

basic understanding of how the UN operates, and to hone student skills in oration and debate. The UCC candidates found that one of the most intriguing aspects about the conference was learning to use diplomacy to find amenable solutions for countries with varying and divergent interests. "One of the most difficult problems to overcome," says UCC student Ted Noakes, "is when the foreign policies of the nations represented are in direct opposition to the principles of the UN." Finding solutions and acceptable compromises in spite of these difficulties is part of the challenge of the model UN experience, and, once again,

UCC showed well. Derek Cook was extremely pleased by the effort and enthusiasm shown by the young team. "The UCC Model UN team was a credit to UCC," he states.

After Toronto, the group proceeded to the Big Apple. After simulating the work of that international body, the students found the experience of actually visiting the UN especially exciting. They also visited the Rockefeller Centre, Times Square, the Statue of Liberty, the Empire State Building, and some Broadway productions. The UCC model UN team is currently preparing for the local high school model UN conference to be held in the CAC on March 12.

Before that, she directed student theatre collectives both at UBC and U of A. This Spring, Annie is facilitating and directing a student collective theatre workshop to explore the process of collective creation.

It's an intensive process--students from the first- and secondyear acting classes will work together six hours a week for eight weeks. Students involved in the workshop will learn and practice ensemble acting skills, identify, research and explore themes and issues relevant to their lives, and develop a theatre piece about these issues using improvisation techniques. Through this collective creative process, students learn self-discipline, leadership skills, and cooperative working skills, and create an original theatre piece which will be performed publicly April 5 and 6.


UCC Sports Success
