



Ken Dryden Keynotes Career Education Conference

Good teachers don't teach subjects, they teach people." So says former NHL star and lawyer Ken Dryden after a year of attending high school, moving from class to class with the students he studied.

As keynote speaker for an important province-wide conference being held here at UCC on Monday, February 17, Ken Dryden will explore questions facing Canadian educators and those they serve. And on Tuesday, February 18, Dryden will speak with students from regional secondary schools at two different sessions, discussing balance, goal setting, life skills, and how personal experiences, both good and bad, can work for their future.

The "School to Life" Career Education/CAPP Conference '97 aims to help educators facilitate a positive transition from secondary, to post-secondary, to life. Any post-secondary educators that see the value and importance of understanding curriculum changes and opportunities in secondary schools that affect a student's transition to post-secondary institutions, or their particular programs, will gain from workshops at this Conference.

New Tourism Program

UCC's new Bachelor of Tourism Management degree program has been approved by Order in Council. Still awaiting internal approvals, the degree will give graduates the business skills and a wide knowledge base to assist the tourism industry to move into the 21st century. The idea of a degree program for tourism management has been around since 1989, and in the development phase for the past two to three years.

Tourism Chair Philip Schettini emphasizes the value of the program, stating that "the tourism industry has become much more complex on a global scale. Canada must have graduates that are aware of the many issues facing the industry today, and the ability to develop tourism initiatives that compete more favourably on a world stage."

It's hoped that the program will be offered as soon as Fall/97.

Textra Connects

UCC is the first post-secondary institution in BC to implement a trial program to allow for a paperless process to submit and mark papers on campus. Called Norton Textra Connect, the software allows instructors to list their assignments, send messages to their students, receive papers and mark them on-line with special drop-down icons and text boxes. The program also allows students to share their ideas with others, use a context-sensitive help menu, send messages to their instructors, and collaborate on papers. Fees are actually \$223.63/credit/semester, for a total of \$3350 per semester for international students. Sport Camp & Mini University

UCC now offers an extensive Sport camp and Mini-University program for children aged 5 - 18.

Mini-camps are half-day camps for ages 5 - 12. The mornings are filled with sport specific camps including basketball, soccer, football, martial arts, rollerblading, track & field, volleyball, etc. The participant signs up for one of the sports per week and also has an option to stay for the afternoon. The afternoon camp is called outdoor activities and water fun and is just that. Another afternoon option for kids 10 -14 is the Mini-University program. In specialized university facilities, students explore three different subjects: Psychology, Sciences, and Visual Arts/Drama. The camps are very hands-on. A half-day camp for one week is \$65 and the full day is \$110.

The UCC Board of Governors announced that it had ratified the collective agreement with CUPE support staff for the period July 1, 1995 up to and including November 30, 1998.

CUPE President (UCC Unit) Ann Henry singled out some language improvements, a \$.20/hour raise retroactive to July 1/95, and, effective Dec 1, 1997, some changes regarding cost-sharing of benefits, as highlights of the new agreement.
