## **Process Outlined for Presidential Search**

With UCC President Jim Wright leaving November 1st for his new job as Executive Director of the Private Post-Secondary Education Commission, the search is on for a new UCC president.

The UCC Board has established a 15-member Search Committee, comprised of three UCC Board members plus the Chair, three students, two representatives each from support staff and administration, and four faculty representing all program types.

Interim President will be Dr. Neil Russell, VP Instruction and Student Services. While he performs the duties of the President, his position will be filled by Dr. Paul Egan, Dean of Sciences & Health Sciences. Associate Science Dean, Dr. Colin James, will become Interim Dean of Sciences & Health Sciences.

The Board will also issue a Request for Proposals to professional search firms. Board Chair, John Harper, expects that the Board will choose a consultant within the next two weeks. The process should be complete by next June, so that the new president will be in place by September. The Search Committee will look for as broad-based input as possible within the UCC Community as the process continues.

# **UCC Leads in Learning Technologies**

VP of Community and Distributed Learning Services, Adrian Kershaw, is not only leading UCC's expansion of educational technology into the future. Along with Doug Baleshta and Jeff McLaughlin, he is helping other post-secondary institutions with their efforts too.

Adrian was the only Canadian invited to present a paper at the prestigious "Virtual Campus Real Learning" Conference held at Wolverhampton University in England this past September. His presentation, entitled "Bridge the Gap and Maintain the Momentum: Innovation Acceptance in Post-Secondary Institutions," was concerned with the development of a viable and effective distributed learning presence in the marketplace.

Adrian was subsequently invited to Oxford University by OxTALENT (Teaching and Learning Enhanced by New Technologies) group coordinator, Tonia Cope Bowley. Oxford has a huge research technology investment, but has been slow in adapting educational technologies for use by students. They now realize that their students need current skills, and that their traditional teaching approach, using small classes and tutorials, lends itself well to educational techniques like the collaborative learning opportunities afforded by such software as Norton Connect and WebCT.

In terms of using educational technologies, UCC is far ahead of universities like Oxford, and our experience is important and interesting to universities still using only traditional teaching modes. Thus, Adrian's presentation, an adaptation of his original paper, to special invitees of the OxTALENT group, was very well received.

And the work goes on. Two UCC faculty members, Doug Baleshta and Jeff McLaughlin, gave presentations related to educational technology at the League of Innovation Annual Conference in Atlanta, Georgia, this year. The League is made up of universities and colleges from around the North America and Europe, and the Annual Conference attracts about 4000 delegates. Doug spoke about the work UCC is doing with Norton

Connect, and Jeff discussed the promotion of educational technology as a powerful, relevant and exciting tool.

In November, Adrian again hits the conference circuit, this time a little closer to home. At the "Bridging the Pacific" Conference and Workshop, Adrian, along with BC Tel, will describe UCC's advances using Interactive Television as an educational tool.



# A C R O S S C A M P U S

Science and Technology Night, held in the Science and the Trades & Technology buildings on the evening of Thursday, October 16, was a success again this year.

A showcase of science, engineering and technology, including displays by Computing, Health Sciences, and Sciences, along with animal, mineral and fossil exhibits, the show was enlarged and enhanced this year with technology and engineering displays in our new Trades & Technology Centre.

The Jack Hik Memorial Garden, located on the south side of the Campus Activity Centre, was established using money from the Jack Hik Memorial Fund, which now totals \$55,000. It was dedicated September 19 this year in honour of Jack Hik, who was instrumental in the development of UCC's Horticulture program.

The UCC Foundation thanks John Feller and the Facilities Department, landscape maintenance staff, Horticulture faculty and students, and David Williams, project coordinator, as well as many donors and supporters, acknowledged on a plaque at the site.

The UCC Library has purchased or received as gifts over 7000 volumes, as well as hundreds of rolls of microfilm since the Chapter 2000 library campaign began. Campaign funds also paid for a new CD Rom and laser disk workstations, a new microfilm reader-printer, and a video projection machine for the library classroom.

UCC and the North Thompson Community Skills Centre have just signed a partnership agreement that will see UCC offering credit courses and the Skills Centre offering all other training in the North Thompson region. UCC will also provide training under contract to the Skills Centre, an arrangement that allows UCC to retain a significant profile in the community.

UCC will award the Governor-General's Silver Medal for the first time at Convocation/98. The Chancellery in Ottawa just approved UCC to receive the medal, for award to the undergraduate with the highest academic standing upon graduation from a UCC bachelor degree program. UCC already awards the Collegiate Bronze Medal for diploma programs two years or longer.

The UCC Board of Governors passed two motions at its September/97 meeting:

"That the Board of Governors endorses Charting a New Course: A Strategic Plan for the Future of British Columbia's College, Institute and Agency System with its Goals of Relevance and Quality, Access, Affordability and Accountability, and undertakes to review the strategies set out in the report and to implement those that are pertinent to the mandate of the University College of the Cariboo."

"That in the interests of improving internal communication and collaborative problem-solving, the Board of Governors invite the President of the Faculty Association, the Chairperson of the Canadian Union of Public Employees, the President of the Cariboo Student Society, and the President of UCC to join with the Board of Governors to form an Institutional Liaison Committee. This Committee, chaired by the Board Chair, will meet regularly to give consideration to matters of broad institutional concern."

The UCC Foundation celebrates its 15th year with \$2.5 million in its endowment fund. Over 500 students received awards in the past year alone from interest received from the fund. The Foundation raises money for student scholarships and bursaries through lotteries like Club Ed and last Spring's "Win Your Tuition" raffle, through planned giving and memorial plans, and through fundraisers like the President's Ball and the Fall Spaghetti Supper and Silent Auction.
