

On October 22nd, Board Chairman Dale Janowsky announced the appointment of Jim Wright as President of Cariboo College. Wright, who has been at Cariboo since 1973, was born in Duncan, B.C., and earned an Honours B.A. and an M.A. at UBC He served two terms as Chairperson of the Social Sciences Department before his appointment as Vice-Principal, Education, in 1978.

Williams Lake Highlighted

This edition of the "Communicator" contains the revised Organizational Chart and a description of changes in Cariboo's organizational structure following the College Board's announcement of the appointment of Jim Wright as the new President.

In addition it features the people of Cariboo College's Williams Lake campus. Jerry McKee, Williams Lake Campus Director, says since moving to the new location in May the campus has been a very busy place. For the first time Williams Lake is now offering University Transfer programs and space is already becoming short.

The Williams Lake Theatre which leases space from the College is preparing for the official opening by the Lieutenant Governor on Friday November 7th, which will be followed by a performance of "Arsenic and Old Lace".

On Thursday October 16th, the Williams Lake campus was visited by Italian Consul General, Dr. Giulio Terzi Sant'Agata, Professor Oberto Verdi, Cultural Attache, and Williams Lake Mayor Ethel Winger. The Consul General was touring the area looking into the possibility of Italian financial investment in the community. Board Member

Changes in Organizational Structure

The announcement of Jim Wright's appointment as President of the College on October 23rd included confirmation from the Board that the College will operate from now on with two senior Executive Officers - the President and the Vice-President.

This requires a significant change in organizational structure since it represents a major shift from the most recent model involving two Vice-Presidents (for education, and for administrative services), and it is even further from that based on a four-person executive which existed until January 1986.

A revised Organizational Chart is shown on the reverse of this sheet. It depicts the new structure as far as the divisional level. In future issues of the "Communicator", individual divisions with their internal structures and personnel will be featured.

The changes in responsibility and reporting relationships necessary to achieve the new structure are as follows:

David Cane, as Vice-President, will assume responsibility for the educational divisions to meet the need for the close coordination of all educational activity. He will also maintain involvement across the College, to effectively support the President.

Derek Chambers will take on the position of Director, Administrative Services. This will incorporate responsibility for the Plant Department as well as the present Information Services Division.

Mel Galloway, Director, Student Services; Cliff Neufeld, Director, Financial Services and Bursar; and the Director, Administrative Services, will report to the President.

Margaret Russell, Information and Public Relations Officer, will assume responsibility for Alumni Liaison and report to the President's Executive Assistant, Bev Sault.

Peggy Orr, Personnel Officer, will report to the President.

Operation of the College with only two Executive Officers will necessitate a considerable increase in delegation of responsibility and accountability to the director level. In addition, division directors will be asked to assume some College-wide functions, which will require more participative decision-making. To facilitate this, Administrative Council membership will be revised to include only the eight directors, the President and the Vice-President. The Joint Council, with broader membership including chairpersons, managers and supervisors from across the College, will continue to provide an information-sharing and consultative forum.





The Earth Moving Project

During a 10-week period beginning April 28th 1986, 190,000 cubic meters of material was set up, moved and compacted through a training program organized by the Operating Engineers Joint Apprenticeship and Training Plan. The cost of this work on the open market would have been roughly \$400,000.

Three crawler dozers, three scrapers and one grader were transported from the Operating Engineers Haney Training Centre, and supplemented by equipment donated locally by Finning Tractor and Dawson Construction. These machines were operated by local members of the Operating Engineers, who took part in a course to upgrade and polish their skills under the direction of instructor Pete Zanatta. The students were supported by the Canada Employment and Immigration Commission during the training

On-site liaison and coordination was provided by Gordon Patterson, the Operating Engineers Local Training Plan Coordinator, and Frank Stevens of Cariboo College. During the project support and services for the equipment were provided through the generous volunteer work of many local companies and individuals, including several vocational

departments at Cariboo College.



Welding Student Awarded CN Scholarship

Welding student Rebecca (Becky) Saunders has been awarded a \$600 Canadian National Railways Scholarship for women enrolled in non-traditional fields. Becky, seen here with Welding Instructor Mickey Zoyetz, is nearing completion of the Level "C" Welding Program at Cariboo and is looking forward to beginning five months of field experience. Congratulations, Becky!

This training project made a major and unique contribution to the Playing Fields Development. Had it not been for the extensive donations and volunteer work, and the initiatives of many individuals, we would probably still be awaiting funding to begin the development of the playing fields.

As work on site progresses, it may be possible to include other training courses such as final grading, irrigation installation, turfing, and fencing. This will reduce costs and provide learning experiences for local students, as well as emphasize the true

community nature of the project.

The long-range development plan for the Playing Fields was approved by the College Board on October 21st; it will be summarised in the December

"Communicator".

Senior management responsibility for the Playing Fields Development will shift from myself to Derek Chambers, Director of Administrative Services.
