Degree Granting Update

While there's no 'official' word yet, there is every indication that the Minister (Hon. Stan Hagen) and the Ministry of Advanced Education are in full support of proceeding with the Access Report recommendations on degree-granting status to interior Colleges.

This positive outlook was reinforced just two weeks ago at a special meeting between the Minister, representatives of the three Universities and Presidents of the colleges involved; Cariboo, Okanagan, CNC and Malaspina.

With tacit approval, Cariboo College has already begun and continues discussions with all three Universities and the Open University with respect to specific degree opportunities.

At this moment, we are looking specifically at degree programs in Arts, Sciences, Business, Education and Nursing, to begin next September, 1989. Other degree programs are also anticiapted in subsequent years.

While official word from Government is not expected until late January, the executive and Administrative Council will begin involving departments more actively in planning for the implementation of upper level courses

next fall.

Degree completion represents and exciting and challenging opportunity which will make our College truly a unique institution in terms of post-secondary offerings in this Province.

Significant one-time only start up funds are expected to go with the decision to proceed, and the College continues to lobby aggressively for more classroom space in the near future. Ultimately, the next five years will see a major expansion of our campus facilities, and have a major economic impact on the City of Kamloops.


Now In The Library

Science Lab For Williams Lake

The much anticipated multi-purpose science lab for our Williams Lake campus has finally been given the green light, and it's full speed ahead towards a September '89 opening.

The announcement from the Ministry came at the end of November, making \$240,000 available to construct the lab. It will enable the College to add chemistry, physics and biology to our university transfer programs for students in the Williams Lake area.

Detailed planning is already underway, and tenders are expected to be called by the end of January.

Campus Housing Now One Step Away

Student housing on campus is just one step away from reality after the College Board approved an agreement with a local developer at their monthly meeting last week.

The agreement with local developer Bill Sanish should see the construction of over 200 units of student housing on campus, ready for occupancy by next September.

Following Board ratification, the agreement now goes to government where it must be approved by both the Ministry of Advanced Education and the Ministry of Finance before it becomes official.

Once final approval has been given, construction would begin as soon as weather conditions permit.

Cariboo College will become only the second regional college in B.C. to provide on campus housing. Malaspina College was the first
to have such facilities available.

Harassment Policy Passed by Board

The comprehensive policy on Sexual Harassment, developed by a committee over the past several months, was passed with the unanimous support of the College Board and college community representatives last week.

The policy will be presented here in complete form at a later date, however it is hailed as a progressive step forward by the college community as a whole in adopting an aggressive stance against sexual harassment in the workplace.

Regulations pertaining to the new policy are still being revised to address some concerns raised at the public board meeting last Wednesday afternoon. However, valuable information obtained at a conference in Winnipeg on this matter by two members of the committee appears to have already taken many of these concerns into account.

New Development Centre Serves B.C. Colleges

Cariboo College President Jim Wright is a member of the governing board of the new Development Centre in Victoria. The following article about that new facility in Victoria is extracted from Camosunews (Dec/88)

B.C. colleges and institutes can now get support in project management for program and curriculum development; can locate provincial curriculum publications and other related documents; and can obtain appropriate services in human resource development at ONE office in downtown Victoria. All this is available plus access to basic office, communication and meeting room facilities that include a classroom designed for teaching computing skills.

The new Development Centre takes in the entire 5th floor of newly appointed premises at 1483 Douglas Street. It brings together former offices from the Ministry of Advanced Education and Job Training (MAEJT) -- the Curriculum & Resources Development Centre, the Secretariat to the Minister's Youth Council, the Premier's Advisory Council on Science and Technology, and Provincial Curriculum Publications -with the anticipated Human Resource Development Centre, and a fully equipped microcomputer lab.

Funded by the Ministry and operated under the auspices of Camosun College, the Development Centre is under the direction of Lorne Thompson.

The governing board represents colleges and institutes

throughout B.C., including
Jim Wright, Lloyd Morin
(Camosun), Bill Day
(Douglas), Paul Gallagher
(VCC), Leo Perra (Selkirk)
and Jack Newberry
(MAEJT).

"The Centre offers project management for program development to all colleges and institutes in B.C., and to universities if the so require" said Lorne Thompson.

"We offer some services for professional development for faculty, administration, support staff and to board members in the postsecondary system."

"We've always existed within the Ministry. Now our funtion will expand to encompass the recommendations from the Human Resource Development feasibility study undertaken last year to the extent that funding permits. We will also act as a catylyst to assist in bringing workshops, seminars, or whatever colleges and institutes want to B.C. If someone wants to bring in experts for professional development we are here to help facilitate

Lloyd Morin, who currently chairs the governing board, added that "there is a considerable interest in making sure the Centre is responsive to the needs of colleges and institutes and that it provides services in professional curriculum development seen to be priorities by the colleges and institutes themselves."

Where Are They Now?

Former Social Sciences Chairperson and (we're told) active local political organizer Alan Artibise is the Director of the School of Community and Regional Planning at UBC. His name appeared in the Dec. 8/88 issue of UBC Reports, announcing his being elected a member of Lambda Alpha International; the Chicago-based professional society that fosters the study of land economics.

One time Chief Counsellor here, Mia Gordon is now at Douglas College. She is the Director for Student Services and Developmental Education, a challenging position to say the least. No doubt all the good training here was responsible for much of her success !!!
