

In addition, a three evening workshop on "Employment in the Corrections Field" was recently attended by some 30 mature students. Seminals wied bloom and id W



Local representatives from labour, business, minority and special interest groups participated in a Regional Forum on post-secondary education on October 27. Held in the College Boardroom, this local assembly was in conjunction with a national forum under way in Saskatoon.

The aim of the national forum was to explore the challenges and opportunities facing Canada's universities and colleges in preparation for the 21st century.

Dr.Cane chaired the Regional Forum which consisted of discussions on three main themes: "The challenges and opportunities facing post-secondary education", "Accessibility to and participation in the post-secondary system" and "The framework for managing and financing post-secondary education". To ensure that the regional views and concerns would be addressed, the recommendations of the local group were submitted for inclusion in the final report of the national forum.


