College Names Overseas Admissions Officer





On Saturday, September 19th approximately 80 college staff attended an in-service workshop entitled "Quality vs Quantity in Education". Following a brief presentation from most of the college's divisions, small group sessions were organized to identify, priorize and discuss existing constraints to educational quality. From dozens of suggestions, five priority issues emerged: staff work loads and class sizes, college educational philosophy, part-time and temporary staff, human resource development and resource allocation.

Following lunch, each of these issues was discussed in depth and action plans and recommendations made. Follow-up work will be required in all five areas and various individuals were requested to take responsibility for this.

Watch for more information in the transcripts of the in-service day which will be distributed college-wide. The in-service was followed by a staff family barbecue attended by over 100 people.

INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION

Cariboo to Proceed with Indonesian Training Project

In cooperation with the Association of Canadian Community Colleges (ACCC) and the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) Cariboo College will continue with a development project in West Java, Indonesia. Through ACCC, CIDA provided funds to the college to allow a team of three individuals to visit Indonesia to examine the feasibility of the project which involves assisting a school in the establishment of a program to train surveying technicians.

The feasibility team which was made up of College President Jim Wright, International Education Coordinator Charles Mossop and Extension Services Coordinator David St. Amand, was in Indonesia between July 21 and August 1, 1987 for discussions with government and school officials.

The school, located at Kodipaten outside the city of Bandung, is a training institution operated by the Central Forestry Education and Training Service of the Indonesian Ministry of Forests. At present the school trains forestry technicians, but the Ministry now proposes to change its focus to the training of land surveyors. There is a desperate shortage of such surveyors in Indonesia since none have been training on a regular basis for the past 17 years.

The project design calls for three Indonesian officials

to visit B.C. in mid-November and then for an instructor from the B.C. post-secondary system to visit the school at Kodipaten on two occasions to discuss new curriculum and equipment needs and then to provide the training in the use and maintenance of new equipment.

Hong Kong Learning Centre

An agreement has been signed between Cariboo College and International Training and Education Consultant (ITEC) Ltd. establishing procedures for accreditation of courses offered by ITEC at its school in Hong Kong.

The agreement, signed on July 16, 1987 in Hong Kong by Ross O'Brien, Educational Director for ITEC and College President Jim Wright, will allow ITEC to request Cariboo College credit for courses in English as a Second Language and ABE level programming.

The College expects that this arrangement will give Hong Kong students the opportunity to do much of their preparatory work before leaving home. College International Education Coordinator Charles Mossop explained that this will result in the students having to do less upgrading when they arrive at Cariboo and allow them to move more quickly into their post-secondary programs.

The College and ITEC have also agreed to discuss the possibility of providing some post-secondary courses in Hong Kong in the future as well as short course offerings such as those provided by Cariboo's Extension Services.


