Russian Interest in Canadian Business

A group from UCC is banking on shared Canadian business expertise to help Russia improve politically and economically.

Even a brief look at Russia's economic problems is enough to make Canadians feel better about our own economy. Our devalued dollar and merging banks may make us nervous, but Russia's bottomed-out ruble, absence of banks and harsh entrepreneurial climate are impoverishing the Russian people. Some world experts even predict a move back to the "bad old days," as people reject teetering Russian free enterprise to clutch at the seeming stability of the old socialist regime.

Some Canadians with an aim to help Russia forge a solid foundation in free enterprise believe that the rest of the world can help that beleaguered country find practical ways to take advantage of progress in economic terms. This March, a group of people from UCC will visit Russia with just such a mission in mind. Economic instructors Jim and Zena Seldon, management consultant Sandy Abraham of the Cariboo Management Centre, international management specialist Ivan Somlai, along with public policy expert Jim Matkin of the Law Society of BC, will participate in an economic conference funded by the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada (AUCC) to be held March 25 to 27 at the School for Management Consultants (SMC) in Moscow.

The SMC trains people to help improve the management of organizations, and will benefit from discussion on business curriculum development, improvement of institutional capacity, and enhancement of management practices and teaching skills. The conference, titled "Doing Business in the 21st Century: The Importance of Trust," will comprise three days of intensive collaboration between Canadian and Russian partners, focusing on the significance of establishing and maintaining trust as a precondition for ongoing economic and democratic development. The Conference and related activities bear directly upon the practical interpretation and implications of trust as a factor of vital importance in the ongoing transfiguration of Russia and other Central and Eastern European nations into market-based economies.

It's not just a case of transplanting traditional North American methods to new soil, explains team member Jim Matkin: "Our goal is to help our Russian partners develop methods and institutional structures appropriate to the Russian context." Member Sandy Abraham adds that Russia is currently in a state of 'learned helplessness.' "Formerly," she says, "the state provided trust, and entrepreneurs were seen as bandits." Training centres like the SMC hope to foster entrepreneurialism and, hopefully, more national economic stability by teaching Russian managers and businesspeople practical ways to take advantage of progress in economic terms.

Species at Risk

This week, 420 delegates are on campus attending the Species at Risk Conference, a week-long showcase of recent research and management techniques related to habitat in the Pacific Northwest. The first major gathering of its kind in BC in nearly 20 years, the Conference has attracted registrations from as far away as England and Ghana. Although most presentations are not open to the public, some evening lectures have limited space available (see the Coming Up section, this issue).

Actor's Workshop Presentation

BC's first play comes to life two centuries later, as the UCC Actor's Workshop presents the long-lost play "Nootka Sound: Or, Britain Prepared." The script was discovered in the British Library by UCC Theatre instructor Jim Hoffman while on sabbatical last year. Costumes and sets will reflect late eighteenth-century styles, and the play's song lyrics, with the original score long since lost, have been set to music again by Rob Peterson, who has composed authentic period tunes. Student actors drawn from UCC acting classes will play the major roles, while the songs will be performed by members of the UCC Chorus.

The production will be staged March 4th to 6th in the Alumni Theatre. Tickets are \$7, available at Bookie's and at the door.

Models of Diplomacy

Be it resolved that . . . 200+ high school students from across the Interior and as far away as the Kootenays and Williams Lake will convene at UCC on Tuesday, March 9th for the Seventh Annual High School Model United Nations Interior Conference.

On that day, these diplomats-in-training will use their debating skills and knowledge of world issues to develop resolutions focused around the theme of genetic manipulation and medical research. Schools send teams of three to five students each, with each team representing a different nation. To prepare for the Model UN, the students spend weeks researching issues related to the main topic, with an eye to the specific foreign policy of their chosen country. By the time they arrive at UCC, the students are ready to negotiate, persuade, discuss and coerce, just like their counterparts in the actual United Nations Assembly.

"We're proud that UCC has built a solid reputation for hosting one of the most authentic Model United Nations conferences available for secondary school students," says UCC Vice-President of Instruction, Dr. Neil Russell. "Model UN diplomacy helps students to think, to negotiate, and to communicate clearly, but, most important, perhaps, it gives them a unique vision of the world and their place within it."

The Model UN Interior Conference, sponsored by The University College of the Cariboo and School District #73, has strong student influence as well. Students from the year's sponsoring high school—Sahali Secondary this year—decide upon the major theme, set the day's agenda, organize the list of committees and potential resolutions, and take a leadership role during the event, acting as chairpersons and directors.

EDDT Program Achieves Third Professional Accreditation

UCC's Engineering Design and Drafting Technology (EDDT) Program stands out as the only program of its kind in BC to offer three separate accreditation streams. As of last fall, program coordinators completed the curriculum development requirements needed for a third professional accreditation by the Applied Science Technologists and Technicians of BC (ASTTBC).

UCC students completing the two-year program may now choose to pursue accreditation as a Building Technologist. The program is already accredited at the technician level in both Mechanical and Civil Technology.

The consortium will provide a mechanism to discuss common issues, challenges and strategies to enhance the reputations and positions of the university colleges in BC, and in national and international business and post-secondary markets.

From time to time, the consortium will also organize conferences on matters related to university college, and will work cooperatively with the Ministry of Advanced Education, AECBC, AUCC, ACCC, the University President Council and various levels of government to inform, enhance and extol the virtues of our unique and successful institutions.


On February 4 and 5, the consortium hosted a retreat at Royal Roads College for Board Chairs, Presidents, VPs, and Education Council Chairs to identify and agree on common characteristics unique to university colleges, to present a united front in dealing with government and other funding agencies.

The consortium has already had an impact on our Ministry which has recently created a new division—the University Colleges and Program Planning Branch—and appointed Gloria Black as director responsible for all five university colleges.
