Directors' Debut

Nine fourth-year directing students will present one-act plays when the UCC Actor's Workshop stages its first Director's Festival on March 24, 25, 26, and 27 in the Alumni Theatre. Three of the student directors, who include Shauna Oman, Ryan Davies, Julia Body, Nicole Bremner, Trent Scherer, Tim Tillyer, Brad Watson, Jenny Mirtle and Cayman Duncan, will also have a chance to showcase their selections at the UCFV Director's Festival in late April. Theatre instructor David Edwards will take three of the plays to that festival, which brings together student-directed plays from most of BC's university and college theatre programs.

The plays, which range from comedy to to serious drama to the experimental, including Sam Shepard's *Red Cross*, Janet Tiger's *The Affadavit* and *Dispatches from Hell* by Melvin Cooperman. Other selections include *Wake*, *Daddy's Home*, *The Whole Truth*, *Just Thinking*, *This is a Play*, and *Hopscotch*. All plays begin at 7:30 pm. Single night tickets are \$7, and patrons wishing to see all of the plays may purchase tickets for two nights' performances at a special price of \$10 for the pair. Administered by the Department of Co-operative and Career Education and coordinated by UCC grad Dwayne Geiger, this program provides recent graduates of the Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Business Administration programs with employability skills training, delivered over three weeks. The program focuses on the use of technology to develop post-graduate career-management skills, a career portfolio, understanding of the labour market, and identification of career alternatives.

The program also offers optional extended professional internships, which run for a minimum of 12 weeks. Internships are normally full-time, paid positions related to the student's discipline which help the student to apply the theory learned in his or her program in a practical, work-learning experience. Internships also links recent graduates with a network of working professionals who can provide references and assistance with the transition from UCC to the workplace.



Staging the Pacific Province: A Conference on British Columbia Theatre







PHOTO: Nicole Chomyszyn (left) and Marilyn Meakins explain the evolving role of the nurse as change agent in the community.



Just Married


