

Student Summer Works '98


Four dedicated students will run the provincially mandated Student Summer Works program out of room B232 in the Old Main Building this summer. Program Administrators Nicole Tomm, Paul Gauci, Dorothie Fetzko and Dieter Hart will work under the supervision of Program Manager Kathie Bryenton to create over 400 employment opportunities for students across the region.

Student Summer Works is a wage subsidy program that enables students to work in fields that relate to their career choices. A total of \$750,000 has been set aside under Youth Options BC to promote the program to employers

throughout the South Cariboo/Shuswap Region, to assit employers with applications and to assess those applications, and to monitor work sites to validate student and employer experience.

This is the first time that UCC has hosted this program, and, to date, 213 full- and part-time jobs have been adjudicated and allocated. The administrators look forward to success in reaching their goal of 440 jobs for students this summer.

UCC Sign Competition Involves Community

The winning design concept for the The University College of the Cariboo Site Identification Design Competition was presented to the UCC Board of Governors at their public meeting April 18th.

The design, submitted by Mr. Dennis Kwan of Kamloops, was chosen from a field of 21 entries. The Committee was impressed with all entries received, and felt that the process as a whole was one with which the community felt a sense of involvement. Each design submitted displayed creativity and an awareness of the comprehensive nature of our university college.

Dennis Kwan's design was selected for its innovative use of materials and its artistic interpretation of the competition criteria. A copperclad arc broken at one end to provide a physical and metaphorical entrance to the campus, the sign allows visibility from all campus approaches.

The use of copper, a locally mined metal, symbolizes UCC's present and future connections to technology. Multiple flag poles integrated into the sign design will fly flags of the province, nation, university college, and, from time to time, signal the presence of special events such as the Canada Games or Festival of the Arts, hosted by UCC.

Janice Latta, chair of the UCC Sign Committee, was very pleased with the competition and its results. "We are grateful for the imagination and thought that all entrants put into their contributions to a distinctive campus identity for The University College of the Cariboo. As a regional institution, we welcome the opportunity to involve our community—the sign competition allowed us to interact with people in a fun and meaningful way."


New Chairs
