# EDDT Receives ASTTBC Accreditation

UCC is the first BC post-secondary institute to offer three engineering accreditions in one program. Students receiving the UCC Engineering Design and Drafting Technology (EDDT) diploma are now eligible to receive provincially recognized professional designation as a Building Technologist under the guidelines of the Applied Science Technologists and Technicians of BC. The diploma is already accredited at the technician level in Mechanical and Civil engineering technology.

For EDDT graduates, this recognition means greater employability, as major employers look for specific accreditation when hiring, and more opportunities for further education. With this accreditation, for instance, BCIT will now allow UCC EDDT grads to ladder into their engineering program.

Accreditation with ASTTBC is ongoing, with education programs reviewed every few years by the professional organization to ensure standards continue to be met. That won't be a problem, according to program chair Walter Prescott. "We continually review, update and improve this program ourselves. We not only meet industry standards. In many cases, we surpass them."

# **Enter Stage Right**

Ten graduates of UCC's Entry-Level Film and Television Production/Technical Assistant extension course found jobs on the set of the film *Daydrift*, which recently completed shooting in Kamloops.

The graduates worked in various departments, including set decoration, grip/electrical, craft services, makeup, and transportation, where their professionalism and energy was acknowledged and appreciated. Another call for trained production assistants went out recently for the film *Shegala*, starring Lynn Redgrave, which began shooting in the Penticton area this month.

UCC plans more related extension courses in the future.



# Child, Youth and Family Advocate of BC Visits UCC

As part of the Social Work and Nursing programs, BC's Child, Youth and Family Advocate Joyce Preston will make a presentation in the Alumni Theatre at 9:00 am on Thursday, October 29.

Joyce Preston is a social worker with over thirty years of experience. After receiving a master's degree in Social Work from UBC, she has worked both inside and outside government in a number of positions, including social worker, district supervisor, instructor, and senior administrator.

Ms. Preston was also a member of the 1991 Community Panel which conducted an extensive review of British Columbia's child protection legislation. Through this breadth of experience, Ms. Preston acquired an in-depth understanding of issues facing children, youth and families.

One of the key recommendations of the Community Panel report, *Making Changes: A Place to Start*, was the establishment of an independent office for a child and youth advocate. The recommended office was established by an Act of the provincial legislature, and, in May of 1995, Ms. Preston was the first Advocate to be appointed by an all-party committee for a six year term.

She works to protect and advance the rights of children and youth, and to inform government and communities about their needs. Her office also investigates any area where a child, youth or family believe themselves to be inadequately or unfairly served by the existing social service structure. 

The food (prepared with loving care by Cook




