UCC Nursing Students in Nepal

UCC's first official externally funded project in Nepal will include two fourth-year Bachelor of Science in Nursing students. The project, coordinated by UCC International Education's Ivan Somlai, with UCC as the lead agency and the Saskatchewan Institute of Applied Science Technology as support, aims to improve the health delivery system at a non-governmental organization hospital in Dhulikhel, just outside Kathmandu in Nepal.

A UCC Nursing faculty member and the two students will travel to the hospital in November or December this year with the goal of identifying and evaluating needs and upgrading the calibre of nursing and ancillary staff at the hospital. One of the student nurse positions is funded through the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA). The project committee will engage in fundraising to support the second student position.

The project also involves an exchange, with nurses from Dhulikhal coming to UCC for practicum experience and upgrading, and the development by UCC of a distance-delivered Management Leadership course for nurses.

A steering committee organized by UCC Nursing is presently working on the project. Associate Dean Chinnama Baines is excited about its potential, and notes that the participating nurse-trainers will need to learn about Nepali culture before departure. A session to provide a cultural background for project participants is set for later this month.

Another UCC First

Karl Larsen is the first UCC instructor to be awarded a Natural Science and Engineering Research Council (NSERC) grant in his own right. Karl has been awarded \$20,000 for his research project, titled "Factors and Mechanisms Controlling Natal Dispersal in Red Squirrels."

UCC NRS student Kevin Frudd and UCC Biology student Debbie Gilmour will work on the project under the direction of Dr. Larsen this summer.

Summer Works at UCC Again

Once again, UCC is the host agency for the Student Summer Works program. This Youth Options BC initiative supports new employment and training opportunities between May and August for secondary and post-secondary students. 50% funding up to \$4 per hour is provided to employers in the South Cariboo/Shuswap region for learning/employment opportunities under this wage-share agreement.

Last year, the four UCC student administrators, Nicole Tomm, Paul Gauci, Dorothie Fetzko and Dieter Hart, working under the supervision of Program Manager Kathie Bryenton, passed the provincial goal of creating 427 part- and full-time student jobs in the first month of operation.

Making Movies

May has been declared Movie Making Month at UCC, and UCC Continuing Education and the BC Interior Film and Television Association are sponsoring a month of movie-making workshops to mark it.

No prerequisites are required for enrolment in courses focusing on such topics as "How to Get an Agent," "Lighting the Set," "Acting for the Camera," "Producing Music Videos, Promos and Commercials," "Set Carpentry," "Introductory Screenwriting," and a dozen other courses tailored to help people find out about and gain hands-on experience for the BC film business. Staging the Pacific Province: A Conference on British Columbia Theatre

What makes BC Theatre unique? Established scholars, artists and performers will share views, notes and experiences around this topic and others at the first-ever conference on BC theatre, to be held here at UCC this May.

Academic papers, special presentations, playwrights' readings, panels and performances of special interest to academics, critics, practitioners and the public will fill three days from May 13 to May 15. Featured performances include the Atlakim Dancers from Vancouver, who will perform Kwakiutl Dances using the famous transformation masks—they were recently featured at the Vancouver Art Gallery. The Western Canada Theatre Company will also present a staged reading of George Ryga's play about the 1970s FLQ crisis, Captives of the Faceless Drummer.

Presentations to pique everyone's interest include papers with titles like "Embracing Oddity: Interpellation and BC Theatre," "Ritual and Popular Theatre," and "Stages of Sharing/Sharing of Stages: Collective Creations & Vancouver Theatre," among many others in celebration of the rich theatrical life of the province.

On the historical side, there will be papers on the shipboard performances of the Royal Engineers during the 1850s, BC's first play—*Nootka Sound; Or, Britain Prepar'd*, and Chinese Theatre in Victoria during the late 1800s.

Guest speakers keynoting the event include Murray
Edwards with an anecdotal discussion of "Andrew Allan in
Vancouver: A Golden Age of Radio Drama," and BC
playwright Joan MacLeod on "You Can Take the Girl Out
of BC, But You Can"t..." In addition, the conference will
feature a variety of panels, displays, videos, and readings.

Conference organizer Jim Hoffman (UCC Theatre) is ecstatic about the depth and eclectic variety of presentations. "We had a great response to our call for papers, and selected eighteen excellent papers from loads of submissions. We also have a great span of presenters, from BC grad students to European professors of theatre theory and performance specializing in BC theatre."

He goes on to explain that the organizers hope to establish an important watershed for the study of BC theatre by providing a focus for scholarship in the field of British Columbia theatre, in both the three-day event and the subsequent publication of papers.

Grants Available

UCC will receive \$58,918 over the next two years in Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) Institutional Grant (SIG) Funding. \$37,500 of this sum is a one-time-only grant, specifically targeted as support for younger researchers. Access to this funding was the result of lobbying by President Barnsley. Although UCC had missed the deadline for applying for the regular three-year SIG program, Dr. Barnsley was successful in convincing SSHRC to award funding to UCC for the remaining two years. The deadline for applying for some of these funds is June 8th, 1999, and funding will be awarded to investigators by July 1st this year by the UCC Scholarly Activities Committee.

For those wishing to apply for a grant or engage in research, there's no better place to start than the 1st **Annual BC University-College Research Conference**, which will be held at UCC May 6 & 7, 1999. Featured will be a grant-writing overview and two workshops on writing grant applications: one for those interested in the social sciences and humanities, and the other for researchers in the natural sciences and engineering. The conference also offers speakers, workshops and poster sessions around the topics of funding, student involvement, community/university partnerships, and programming initiatives.

The committee has been engaged in an inventory of all UCC computer equipment, and all campus-wide utilities, electrical, lighting, mechanical, sprinkler, HVAC, natural gas, elevator, master clock and security systems, as well as an inventory of equipment not covered by Computer Services and the Facilities Division.

An issue concerning lab specimens, livestock, and other live animals and plants has recently been identified. Although it is expected that BC Hydro and BC Gas services will not be interrupted, there is a potential problem if heating or cooling systems fail. Education Council Summary

Education Council at UCC is a body formed under the College and Institutes Act to advise on the development of educational policies and to set criteria for the development, implementation and evaluation of curriculum. Since September, 1998, the Council, composed of representatives from administration, faculty, staff, students and the Board of Governors, has discussed and approved the following:

- procedure for approval of Academic Designations and a standardized CV format and checklist for the evaluation of applications for academic designation;
- approval of affiliation agreements between UCC and OLA, and UCC and the Neskonlith Education and Employment Development Society;
- evaluation and approval of 92 new courses;
- evaluation and approval of four new programs, including the Certificate in Business Management, the Interdisciplinary Minor in Archaeology and Geology, the Minor in Business Administration under the Bachelor of Science degree, and the Primary Care Clinical Nursing Program;

- approval of program reviews of the Library and the Office of the Registrar;
- review and comment on the Information Technology Plan and the Program Profile;
- comment on the review of the mandates and organization of Business, Industry and Government Services (BIGS);
- discussion and approval of new policies related to Employee and Student Conduct;
- review and comment to the BC Council of Admissions and Transfer on the appropriateness of Associate Degrees.
- Orientation for the new Education Council took place early this month, and a new chair will be selected at their next meeting, set for 3:00 pm on April 28 in A126.

Provincial Education Roundtable Hosted by UCC

In March this year, representatives from BC teacher education institutions, the BC College of Teachers, the BC Teachers Federation, and School District #73 gathered at UCC to discuss BC teacher preparation, practicum placements, advising, and program development.

A highlight was an Orff musical instrument demonstration by 55 first-year UCC Bachelor of Education students, under the leadership of Music Education instructor Mary Landers. Second-year B.Ed students participated in conference organization.

With expectations of a teacher shortage some time in the future, the Roundtable discussions are important for considering both numbers of new teachers and the particulars of their preparation. This year's roundtable centred on ways institutions can maintain the quality of their programs in campus courses and in school practicum sites. With a new Bachelor of Education program presently in the design stages, both topics were of particular interest to staff and students of UCC's School of Education. The new program should be implemented in September, 2001.

Joint Conference Examined Child Welfare

The first joint initiative of UCC and Nicola Valley Institute of Technology (NVIT), the one-day conference "Identity, Belonging and Struggle—Hearing the Stories" held on Monday, March 29, at the Merritt Convention & Civic Centre, focused on child welfare in the 20th and 21st centuries through panels, presentations and workshops.

Featured was a panel presentation with Joyce Rigaux, former Superintendent of Child Welfare for BC and one of the prime actors in the Gove Inquiry controversy, First Nations activist and former Spallumcheen band chief Wayne Christian, and reporter Kathy Tait of the *Vancouver Province*. The panel, hosted by UCC Social Work instructor Christopher Walmsley centred on the theme "Politics, the Media and Child Welfare."

Improvisational dramatists Trevor Cameron and Forest Funmaker explored residential schools, foster care, adoption, family violence and racism in the schools in another of the day's main presentations. This no-holds-barred examination of children's struggles was complemented by an art exhibit, "Generational Trauma," presented by students and alumni of NVIT's fine arts program.

The day was rounded out by workshops on such topics as art & play therapy for abused children, film media, the reclamation of heritage, and a tour of the Scw'exmx Child and Family Services.
