Work study positions may be specialized or general, and students must be BC student loan recipients and enrolled in at least 60% of a full-time program of study to qualify. The objective of the program is to provide additional funding to those students whose needs are not fully met under the main BC assistance program. Got What It Takes?

Job trends into 2000 call for added emphasis on tourism, technical, and knowledge-related jobs.

A whopping 44,600 new jobs will open up in the tourism sector by 2005, claim the pulp prophets, a forecast echoed by Human Resources Development Canada figures. Specifically, these jobs will be in transportation, travel organization, and tourist attractions.

Customer communication is key for success, say tourism industry employers, as are good interpersonal skills. This means UCC Tourism students have great prospects! Former students rate their UCC training in interpersonal skills 9% higher than provincial average listed in the Ministry of Advanced Education, Training and Technology's 1998 Performance Report.

Good news for electronics students! 20,000 to 40,000 technical jobs currently unfilled in Canada complement an additional 60,000 in the US, say industry sources. Due to a curriculum focus on employability skills, UCC's career-technical students rate 4% higher in job placement and preparedness categories than the provincial average. Seventy-eight percent of UCC's tech

alumni are employed, with 61% of those polled finding jobs related to their training within 9 to 12 months after graduation.

Labour market demand for high school grads has dropped, while job-seekers with some level of post-secondary are finding it easier to get work related to their education, according to The Employability of University Graduates in the Humanities, Social Sciences, and Education: Recent Statistical Evidence by Robert C. Allen (Economics, UBC). This trend can only continue.

Ed Council Highlights

UCC Education Council has been very busy! Last semester, Ed Council approved 54 new courses, 5 new programs, including the new Bachelor of Fine Arts degree, the Asthma Educators Program, and the Wood Process Technology program, as well as 11 course changes, 11 program changes, and one academic faculty designation. An Articulation Agreement between School District #74 (Gold Trail) and UCC was also approved, and has since been approved by the UCC Board of Governors.

Need for new facility for UCC Animal Health Technology Program "critical"

The number one Animal Health Technology (AHT) program in Canada is running the risk of losing its national accreditation if new facilities for the program aren't developed soon, says Dr. Dave Sedgman, chair of the two-year diploma program that leads the country in graduation rankings of graduates.

The accreditation committee for the Canadian Veterinary Medical Association, in its recommendations five years ago, stated that "the buildings are old, marginal for an academic program in a modern university, and a plan for appropriate accommodation in the future should begin to take shape."

As well, the Canadian Council on Animal Care (CCAC), which made similar recommendations ten years ago, has followed up its concerns with UCC as recently as this past September, registering a concern that there has been no progress made in replacing the current facility.

Established in 1981, the facility today comprises three WWIIera houses, two of which are joined by a hallway. It houses offices for seven staff, lockers and changerooms for 48 students, kennel areas for 15 dogs and 23 cats, a classroom, clinical laboratory space, a surgery area, a teaching laboratory, radiology, surgery preparation area, anaesthesia machine storage, laboratory animal space, laundry facilities, and an isolation area, all in a working area of just 5,000 square feet.

The UCC Board has made the construction of a new facility one of its top issues for the coming year, and is hopeful that the serious implications of losing a national accreditation will be helpful in securing funding soon.

UCC Business Grads

For the third year in a row, business graduates from the University College of the Cariboo (UCC) bettered the national accounting examination pass rate. UCC graduates writing the Chartered Accountant exam this year received an 88% pass rate compared to the national pass rate of 65%, and UCC grads writing the Certified Management Accountant exam achieved a 100% pass rate, compared to the national rate of 65%.

Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) degree graduates Christine Anderson, Patrick Gramiak, Christopher Newton, Brendan Sallis, Darryl Tateishi, Sean Wandler, and Carl Foreman were successful in achieving their Chartered Accountant (CA) designation upon completion of the CA national accreditation exam.

Accounting Technician Diploma graduates **Wade Schatz**, **Dwayne Lesiuk** and **Brian Noel**, along with BBA grad **Duncan Middleton**, successfully completed the Entrance Exam for the Certified Management Accountant (CMA) Strategic Leadership Program, the final step in achieving their CMA designation.

The Uniform National Exams are standardized tests for achievement of the professional designation. The exams are developed and graded by the two professional accounting organizations, the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants and the Society of Management Accountants of Canada.

This year, the UCC graduates scored an astounding 23% higher on average than all other test candidates.

Successful completion of this examination is required for certification or registration in professional Animal Health or Veterinary Technology associations. The AHT program at UCC is one of 18 programs available in Canada and the only one of its kind offered in BC.
